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PREFACE

This report, the first of its kind in the Caribbean Community (CARICOM), highlights statistics on International Trade in Services for twelve Member States of the Region. The impetus for this historic and timely report is the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA) funded Project, *CARICOM Protocol II- Trade Policy and Facilitation Project*, a component of which focused on Strengthening of Statistical Capabilities in Member States to produce statistics on International Trade in Services. The statistical component included a situational assessment on the state of services statistics and regional and pilot national workshops. Arising out of the situational assessment, broad-based recommendations were made relative to the production of statistics on international trade in services and a work programme was designed.

Relative to increased globalisation and regional and hemispheric integration, multilateral negotiations involving services of the World Trade Organization (WTO)/General Agreement on Trade in Services (GATS), and movement towards the Caribbean Single Market and Economy (CSME), the need was seen to establish a framework to facilitate the production of statistics on services. Such a framework is essential to support the CSME, including defining scope for the Caribbean Court of Justice (CCJ) as the Region seeks to respond to global and hemispheric changes, commitments that have to be negotiated with the WTO, the hemispheric arrangements of the Free Trade Area of the Americas (FTAA) and the new arrangements with the European Union (EU).

The approach to producing this report attempts to use a common methodological framework that is grounded in statistics on the Balance of Payments (BOP) provided by Central Banks and Central Statistical Offices in Member States. In particular, the Services component of the Current Account of the BOP was the basis for the data that have been compiled. No data were available for Guyana and Suriname. Apart from these two Member States all other member states produce their BOP statistics in accordance with the Balance of Payments Manual *fifth edition* (BPM5), standard components. In at least two cases, Barbados and Belize, efforts have been instituted to produce more detailed information. Essentially the approach that has been activated in the Region to produce services statistics includes the following:

- *Data on services transactions between residents and non-residents of an economy should be compiled according to the Extended Balance of Payments in Services (EBOPS). Firstly, all Member States should ensure that data for the BOP are compiled according to the standard components of the BPM5 which should be followed by movement to the EBOPS;*
- *Additionally, there is also the need to produce more detailed industry data at the level of production of services and to closely link the data on production with that on trade as well as to produce data by origin and destination;*
- *To satisfy the data requirements at the national and regional level including that of our regional negotiators, it may be necessary on a selective basis to give consideration to the production of data at the level of the United Nations Central Product Classification (CPC);*
- *National statistical offices have also been encouraged to activate the process of obtaining more comprehensive establishment registers and to pay attention to improving response rates in establishment and other surveys;*

- *The production of common methodological guidelines at the regional level inclusive of the use of a common classification system to be used for the production of statistics across all Member States is also an imperative.*

These are but a few of the steps required to enable the expansion of statistics on services beyond the set currently presented in this report. In the case of Belize, already the details of services transactions that are being attempted quite closely match the EBOPS. Barbados also presents impressive details. The Member States of the Organization of Eastern Caribbean States and the Eastern Caribbean Central Bank (ECCB) are also making advances towards a more detailed format. Even in these cases, the challenge that lies ahead is evident and will be even greater for product level details. It is obvious in some cases that estimates are not made for certain categories of services or are inadequate and incomplete. For example, the data inadequacy may be due to problems related to the unavailability of information as a result of removal of foreign exchange restrictions in particular member states which has therefore removed a vital source of information on *financial services* or *business and other travel*. In addition, the absence of surveys that can provide complete information on services delivered through consultants (inward or outward) of the compiling economy, affect the coverage of services traded.

One main outcome of the CIDA project has been the setting up of a working group in services statistics. This working group has designed a proposal to sustain the efforts that have commenced through the project. The working group will be primarily concerned with the development of a comparable data set for the CARICOM Member States in the core services areas which have been identified as being tourism (travel), financial, business and professional, entertainment, education, information and communication technology (ICT) and health.

The present report is therefore exploratory, highlighting the current data available but also some of the problems that exist relative to coverage, accuracy, reliability and in general methodological issues concerning the production of these statistics. Users should therefore proceed with caution relative to the interpretation of the data, percentage changes and rates of growths, which may be due to the absence of data and may require further investigations and explanations at the level of Member States. These issues will be dealt with further under the section *About the Data*, which precedes the data highlights. This section attempts to draw attention to the quality of the data in the report and the directions that we need to take to improve the same.

1. *CARICOM* refers to the Caribbean Single Market and Economy (CSME) and The Bahamas. The Caribbean Common Market has been transformed into the CSME upon the signing of the nine Protocols revising the Treaty of Chaguaramas. The Bahamas is not a part of the CSME.
2. Figures may not always add up due to rounding errors.
3. Data are not available for Guyana and Suriname. These two countries do not yet present their Balance of Payments data according to the Balance of Payments Manual 5th Edition.
4. Calculations at the levels of CARICOM, MDCs, LDCs and OECS, exclude those countries for which data may not be available.
5. *Credits* refer to the *Exports* or *receipt* of services, while *Debits* refer to the *Imports* or *payments*.

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CONCEPTS AND DEFINITIONS

1. General Note on Framework of International Trade in Services

1.1 Framework for compiling International Trade in Services

Basic Framework

The United Nations Draft Manual on Statistics of International Trade in Services (MSITS) provides guidelines for statistical compilers and users of statistics on international trade in services. The statistical framework in this manual builds upon two international agreed standards of data compilation: the International Monetary Fund (IMF) Balance of Payments Manual, fifth edition (BPM5) and the System of National Accounts 1993 (1993 SNA). These two frameworks are basically consistent. Since the data in this report are derived from the Current Account of the Balance of Payments statistics of Member States, the concepts are essentially derived from the BPM5 framework with respect to definition, valuation and classification. More detailed definitions and explanations are found in the Draft Manual on Statistics of International Trade in Services.

Foreign Affiliate Trade in Services (FATS)

Foreign Affiliate Trade in Services statistics measure the commercial presence abroad of service suppliers through affiliates in foreign markets. This represents an extension of the meaning of trade in services to cover the value of services delivered through locally affiliated enterprises, unlike in the BPM5 where coverage is restricted to service transactions between residents and non-residents. FATS statistics are not included in this report.

Sources of Data for the Compilation of Trade in Services

Most Member States of CARICOM are compiling Balance of Payments according to the BPM5. This is with the exception of Guyana and Suriname. Suriname is currently converting to the BPM5 format. The Central Banks of Barbados, The Bahamas, Belize, Jamaica and Trinidad and Tobago are responsible for the production of the Balance of Payments. The Central Statistical Office of Trinidad and Tobago is associated with the production of the Balance of Payments in that country. For the OECS Member States, the National Statistical Office produces the Balance of Payments with support from the Eastern Caribbean Central Bank (ECCB).

Production of Services

Relative to the 1993 SNA, efforts are in place in all Member States to implement this format of producing National Accounts. These efforts have been supported by a series of Regional Workshops convened by the CARICOM Secretariat and supported by the United Nations Statistics Division (UNSD). The UNSD has also directly conducted a National Accounts mission in Guyana.

The Four GATS Modes of Supply

The concept of modes of supply seeks to address the modalities through which services are delivered. Under the GATS, the modalities by which services are delivered are central to the measurement of international trade in services. These modes are:

Mode 1: Cross border supply

Cross-border supply takes place when the consumer remains in his or her home territory while the service crosses the border, the supplier being located in another country. Examples of the delivery of this mode of delivery are: fax, Internet, telephone, mail and so forth. Freight services associated with the transport of goods and correspondence courses are examples of services delivered by this mode.

Mode 2: Consumption abroad

Consumption abroad occurs when a consumer moves outside his or her home territory and consumes services in another country. Tourist activities such as visits to museums, theatres, and accommodation expenditure are examples of consumption abroad.

Mode 3: Commercial presence

Commercial presence covers those services that entail the establishment of a commercial presence abroad to ensure close contact with the consumer in his or her home territory during production, delivery and after-delivery. Commercial presence covers juridical persons in the strict legal sense and also legal entities, such as branches, representative offices, and subsidiaries of foreign companies.

Mode 4: Presence of Natural Persons

Occurs when an individual moves to the territory of the consumer to provide a service on his or her own behalf or on behalf of his or her employer. Presence of natural persons covers non-permanent employment in the country of the consumer. Examples are short-term professionals, intra-corporate staff transfers, short-term employment of foreign staff in foreign affiliates, construction workers and domestic helpers.

Concept of Residence

This is a fundamental concept to the BOP since the transactions that are included in the BOP are those that occur between residents and non-residents. The concept of residence is based on two notions: the *centre of economic interest* and the *economic territory* of a country. The *economic territory* of a country comprises the geographic territory administered by a government. Within this territory persons, goods and capital move freely. Included in the economic territory are the airspace, territorial waters and continental shelf lying in international waters over which the country enjoys exclusive rights, or claims to have jurisdiction over fishing rights and so forth. Territorial enclaves of a country in the rest of the world such as embassies, consulates and military bases form part of the economic territory of that country. However, free zones, bonded warehouses and offshore enterprises form part of the economic territory of the country in which these are located.

With respect to the notion of the centre of economic interest, an institutional unit has a centre of economic interest within a country when there exists, within the economic territory of the country, some location, dwelling, place of production or other premises in or from which it engages in economic activities on a significant scale for a period of time usually for one year or more.

Under the concept of residence in the BPM5, the domestic sales of a foreign affiliate (FATS) are not included in the BOP. However as mentioned above these services are included in international trade in services. The concept of residence is also not based on nationality

1.2 Classification Systems for Trade in Services

There are five main classifications that are relevant to be mentioned. In the preface, mention has already been made of the BPM5 standard components of the IMF (Annex I), of which the services component is essentially the foundation for the production of statistics on international trade in services. The other classifications of importance to services are the *Extended Balance of Payments in Services (EBOPS)*, the *GATS Services Sectoral Classification (GNS/W/120)*, the *United Nations Central Product Classification (CPC version 1.0)* and particularly with regard to production the *International Standard Industrial Classification of all Economic Activities -Revision 3 (ISIC Rev. 3)*. The EBOPS is essentially a disaggregation of the BPM5 classification. The EBOPS classification is shown in Annex II

The GATS Services Sectoral classification (GNS/W/120) identifies a list of relevant sectors and sub-sectors of services which resulted from consultations with member countries. The list facilitates negotiations of specific commitments with regards to national services regulations and is therefore considered a classification for negotiation purposes rather than statistical. This list is reproduced in Annex IV.

The CPC constitutes a comprehensive product classification covering both goods and services. The main aim of establishing the CPC classification was to derive an international standard for compiling and disseminating data requiring product detail such as in national accounts (covering both goods and service industries), domestic and foreign commodity trade, international trade in services, balance of payments, industrial production, consumption and price statistics. The CPC is also fully harmonized with the Harmonized Commodity Description and Coding System (HS) with respect to the classification of goods. Of primary concern was also the need to harmonize various types of statistics. An excerpt from this classification is presented in Annex V. At present, the CPC version 1.1 is available but this is provisional. The MSITS provides a correspondence between the EBOPS and the CPC, a sample of which can be found in Annex VI and in Annex VII, a correlation between the GNS/W/120 and the CPC is presented.

The International Standard Industrial Classification of All Economic Activities Revision 3 (ISIC Rev. 3) is utilised to facilitate data comparison in the areas of economic and social statistics such as industrial production, value added and employment. The ISIC is a standard classification of productive economic activities in accordance with the kind of activity of an enterprise or establishment. This classification is available in Annex IX.

1.3 Recommendations for the Compilation of Statistics on International Trade in Services

The summary of recommendations with respect to the compilation of statistics on international trade in services from the Draft Manual on Statistics of International Trade in Services is outlined below:

- The recommendations in the BPM5 with respect to the principles of recording (residency, valuation, time of recording, currency of recording and conversion) are to be followed.

- Data on services transactions between residents and non-residents of an economy should be compiled according to the EBOPS classification. Of highest priority is the compilation of data at the level of BPM5; this should be followed by the introduction of the EBOPS level of detail, but taking into consideration the data requirements in individual compiling economies. Of less immediate priority is the compilation of data on the EBOPS classification memorandum items.
- Data should be compiled on an individual trading partner basis, at least at the level of the 11 major components of the BPM5 classification
- Data for total services transactions with related or unrelated parties
- Each EBOPS component should be allocated either to one dominant mode or where there is no single dominant mode, to the most significant modes of supply. This is accorded a low priority.

2. Concepts and Definition of Services

Definition of Services

The *Draft Manual on Statistics of International Trade in Services* uses the definition in accordance with the 1993 SNA: Services are not separate entities over which ownership rights can be established. They cannot be traded separately from their production. Services are defined as heterogeneous outputs produced to order and typically consist of changes in the conditions of the consuming units realized by the activities of the producers at the demand of the customers. By the time that the production is completed they must have been provided to the consumers

The data for the current report were derived from the Services Component of the Balance of Payments. The BOP Current Account is divided into three components: Goods and Services (which is further sub-divided); Income and Current Transfers. Four main items under services that comprised the focus of the report are Transportation, Travel, Commercial and Government Services. These and other items are defined below.

2.1 Transportation services

Transportation comprises *international* receipts and payments for all modes of transportation performed by residents of one economy for those of another and auxiliary and supporting services related to transport. Transportation includes the carriage of goods (freight), passenger and rental of carriers with crew, cargo handling fees, navigation fees and maintenance.

The modes of transport are therefore: sea, air, and other. Some items that are excluded from transport include, freight insurance (included in insurance services); goods procured in port by non-resident carriers and repairs of transportation equipment (included in goods); repairs of railway, harbour and airfield facilities (construction services); and rentals and charters of carriers without crew (included in other business services-operating leasing services).

Included in passenger services are those passenger services performed within an economy provided by non-resident carriers to residents, fares that are part of a package tour, charges for excess baggage, vehicles or other personal accompanying effects and personal expenditure made while on board carriers.

Excluded are passenger services provided to non-residents by resident carriers within the resident economies (travel services) and cruise fares (travel services).

2.2 Travel

Travel includes all services acquired for *personal use* by a traveller during a visit in a host economy, for a period of less than one year. The goods and services are purchased on behalf of the traveller or provided quid pro quo. A traveller is a person staying for less than one year in an economy of which he or she is not a resident. Excluded from the definition of a traveller are: persons stationed at a military base or a dependent of such a person, a person working for an agency of his or her government; Expenditure made by these persons is recorded under government services.

Expenditure made in the economy of an employing enterprise by seasonal or border workers are recorded under travel. In the case of the BPM5, the one-year guideline does not apply to students or patients receiving health care abroad, who remain residents of the economy of origin even if the length of stay in another country is one year or more. The BPM5 recommends a breakdown of travel into *business*, *personal* and *other travel*.

Excluded from travel is the international carriage of travellers which is covered under transportation. However passenger services provided to non-residents by resident carriers within the resident economies and cruise fares are included in travel services.

It should be noted that the concept of a *traveller* used in the MSITS and the BPM5 differs from the concept of *visitor* used by the World Tourism Organization in the Tourism Satellite Accounts (TSA). The BPM5 and the MSITS regard students and medical patients as residents of their economies of origin, recording their expenditure under travel, even if the period of time in another country is more than a year. However TSA do not regard the students and medical patients who have been in another country for more than one year as a visitor since their "usual environment" will be the university or the hospital or wherever they live.

A second point of difference between the TSA and the BPM5/MSITS is on the question of remuneration. The TSA exclude those visitors whose primary purpose is in the exercise of an activity for which they are being remunerated from within the place of visit. The BPM5 and the MSITS adhere to the one year guideline recommending that if a person moves to a country for the purpose of remuneration for a period of less than one year then the person must be regarded as a traveller notwithstanding the purpose of the visit. An example of this is border and seasonal workers that are included in the case of the BPM5 and the MSITS but are excluded in the TSA.

2.2.1 Business Travel

Business travel covers travellers going abroad for all types of business activities such as carrier crews stopping off or laying over; government employees on official travel; employees of international organizations on official business and employees working for enterprises that are resident in an economy different from that of the employee. They may be in an economy for sales campaigns, market exploration, commercial negotiations, missions, meetings, production or installation work or other business purposes on behalf of an enterprise resident in another economy. Also included as business travellers are seasonal and border workers who are residents of one economy employed by enterprises in a different economy.

Business travel comprises goods and services acquired by the traveller for his or her own use including those reimbursed by employers but excluding the sales or purchases that the travellers may conclude on behalf of the enterprise they

represent. Personal expenditure by seasonal or border workers in economies in which they are employed are recorded under business travel.

2.2.2 Personal Travel

Personal travel covers travellers going abroad for purposes other than business such as holidays, participation in recreation and cultural activities, visits with friends and relations, pilgrimage, and education and health-related purposes. It is recommended that personal travel be broken down into three sub-components: health related expenditure (total expenditure by those travelling for medical reasons); education-related expenditure (total expenditure by students) and all other travel.

2.2.3 Recommendations on Alternative Breakdown of Travel

The MSITS recommends a further breakdown of travel into: Expenditure on goods; Expenditure on accommodation and restaurant services; and all other travel expenditure to be included in the Memorandum items of the EBOPS.

All goods and services (except international passenger fares) acquired by travellers from the economies in which they are travelling for their own use are recorded under travel. The most common goods and services are: lodging, food, beverages, entertainment and transportation within the country.

2.3 Communication

Communication services covers postal and courier services and telecommunication services. *Postal and courier services* covers the pick-up, transport and delivery of letters, newspapers, periodicals, brochures, other printed matter, parcels and packages, including post office counter and mailbox rental services. Included in this component are: telegrams, post office counter services such as sale of stamps, money orders and so forth. Excluded are financial services rendered by postal administration such as postal giro, banking and savings accounts, mail preparation services.

Telecommunication services comprises the transmission of sound, images or other information by telephone, telex, telegram, cable and broadcasting, satellite, electronic mail, facsimile services, teleconferencing and so forth. It does not include the value of the information transported. Also included are cellular telephone services, internet services. Excluded are installation services of telephone networks equipment (included in construction services) and database services and related computer services to access and manipulate data provided by database servers (included in computer and information services).

2.4 Construction Services

Construction services covers work performed on construction projects and installation by employees of an enterprise.

In the BPM5, expenditure on goods and services purchased in the host economy are to be included in *other business services* which is a deviation from the recommendation above.

The MSITS recommends that construction be broken up into *construction abroad* and *construction in the reporting economy*. This recommendation allows for a disaggregation for the recording of both the construction services provided and the goods

and services purchased in the host economy by non-resident enterprises that are providing the services.

2.5 Insurance Services

Insurance services covers the provision of various types of insurance to non-residents by resident insurance enterprises and vice-versa. These services are estimated or valued by the service charges included in total premiums. Separate estimates are recommended for freight insurance, pension funding, other direct insurance, reinsurance and life.

Freight: the insurance service charges for resident insurers providing insurance services to non-residents are estimated as the difference between premiums earned and claims payable on goods lost or destroyed.

For pension funding and other direct insurance: Insurance services are estimated in a similar manner to freight as the difference between premiums earned and claims payable.

2.6 Financial Services

Financial services covers financial intermediation and auxiliary services except those of life insurance enterprises and pension funds (which are included in life insurance and pension funding) and other insurance services that are conducted between residents and non-residents. Financial services include those provided by banks, stock exchanges, factoring enterprises, and credit card enterprises.

Included in financial services are: explicit and implicit commissions and fees such as: deposit taking and lending, including mortgage and non-mortgage loan services for business and personal purposes; letters of credit, bankers' acceptances, lines of credit and other similar instruments; financial leasing; factoring; financial derivative transactions and so forth; financial advisory services; custody services for financial assets and bullions; financial asset management services; merger and acquisition services; corporate finance and venture capital services; credit card and other credit granting services; the spread on foreign exchange transactions; administration of financial markets; credit rating; and so forth.

Excluded from financial services are: interest earned on deposits, loans, financial leases and debt securities (investment income); dividends earned; life insurance and pension intermediation services (life insurance and pension funds); other insurance services; non-financial advisory services provided by banks; gains and losses made on purchase and sales of securities and financial derivatives on own account and FISIM.

Two memorandum items are recommended for completion: financial intermediation services indirectly measured (FISIM) and financial services including FISIM.

The BPM5 does not recommend the inclusion of FISIM in the imports and exports of services.

2.7 Computer and related services

Computer services consists of hardware and software related services and data processing services such as: hardware and software consultancy services; maintenance and repair of computers and peripheral equipment; disaster recovery services; provision

of advice, and assistance on matters related to the management of computer resources; analysis and design and programming of systems ready to use (including web page development and design); and technical consultancy related to software development, production, supply and documentation of customized software, including operating systems made on order for specific users; systems maintenance and other support services such as training provided as part of consultancy; data processing services such as data entry, tabulation, processing on a time-sharing basis; web page hosting services and computer facilities management.

Excluded from computer services are the provision of packaged (non-customised) software (classified as goods therefore not included in EBOPS) and non-specific computer training courses (included in other personal, cultural and recreational services). *News agency services* includes the provision of news, photographs and feature articles to the media. *Other information and provision services* includes database services, database conception, data storage and the dissemination of data and databases (including directories and mailing lists), both on-line and through magnetic, optical or printed media; and web search portals (search engine services that find internet addresses for clients who input keyword queries). Also included are direct, non-bulk subscriptions to newspapers and periodicals whether by mail, electronic transmission or other means.

2.8 Royalties and license fees

Royalties and license fees includes franchises and similar rights such as international payments and receipts of franchising fees and the royalties paid for the use of registered trademarks; other royalties and license fees for international payments and receipts for the authorized use of intangible non-produced, non-financial assets and proprietary rights (such as patents, copyrights, and industrial processes and designs) and with the use through licensing agreements of produced originals and prototypes (such as manuscripts, computer programmes and cinematographic works and sound recordings). Payments and receipts for the outright purchases or sale of these assets and rights are excluded (following BPM5, these are recorded as capital account transactions, not as services). Excluded also are distributive rights for audiovisual products for a limited period or a limited area, these are included in audiovisual and related services.

The MSITS recommends that *royalties and license fees* that appears in the BPM5 format be disaggregated into *franchise and similar rights* and *other royalties and license fees*.

2.9. Other Business Services

The coverage of other business is identical to the coverage of the BPM5 component however the disaggregation proposed is more detailed than in the BPM5.

2.9.1 Merchanting

Merchanting is defined as the purchase of a good by a resident of the compiling economy from a non-resident and the subsequent resale of the good to another non-resident; during the process the good does not enter or leave the compiling economy.

2.9.2 Other trade-related services

Other trade-related services covers commissions on goods and service transactions between (i) resident merchants, commodity brokers, dealers and commission agents and (ii) non-residents. This component also includes

transactions in ships, aircraft and sale of goods by auction. Excluded are franchising fees (included in franchise and similar rights) brokerage and financial services (included in financial services) and transport-related fees (included in transportation services).

2.9.3 Operational leasing services

Operational leasing services covers resident/non-resident leasing (rental) and charters, without operators, of ships, aircraft and transport equipment such as railway cars, containers, rigs and so forth without crew. Excluded are financial leasing (capital leasing), leasing of telecommunications lines or capacity (included in telecommunication services), rental of ships and aircraft with crew (included in transportation services) and rental of vehicles to foreign travellers (included in travel).

2.9.4 Legal services

Legal services covers legal advisory and representation services in any legal, judicial and statutory procedures; drafting services of legal documentation and instruments; certification consultancy; and escrow and settlement services.

2.9.5 Accounting, auditing, bookkeeping and tax consultancy services

Accounting, auditing, bookkeeping and tax consultancy services covers the recording of commercial transactions for businesses and others; examination services of accounting records and financial statements; business tax planning and consulting; and preparation of documents.

2.9.6 Business and management consultancy and public relations services

Business and management consultancy and public relations services covers advisory, guidance and operational assistance services provided to businesses for business policy and strategy and overall planning, structuring and control of an organization. Included are management auditing; market management; human resources; production management and project management consultancy; and advisory, guidance and operational services related to improving the image of clients and their relations with the general public and other institutions.

2.9.7 Advertising, market research and public opinion polling transactions

Advertising, market research and public opinion polling transactions covers the design, creation and marketing of advertisements by advertising agencies; media placement, including the purchase and sale of advertising space; exhibition services provided by trade fairs, the promotion of products abroad; market research; telemarketing and public opinion polling.

2.9.8 Research and development

Research and development covers basic research, applied research and experimental development of new products and processes. In principle activities in the physical, social sciences and humanities are covered, including the development of operating systems that represent technological advances. Also included is commercial research related to electronics, pharmaceuticals and

biotechnology. Excluded are technical studies and consultancy work (included in business and management consultancy, public relations services).

2.9.9 Architectural, engineering and other technical services

Architectural, engineering and other technical services covers transactions between residents and non-residents related to architectural design of urban and other development projects; planning and project design and supervision of dams, bridges, airports, turnkey projects and so forth; surveying; cartography; product testing and certification and technical inspection services. Mining engineering is included in mining services.

2.9.10 Waste treatment and depollution services

Waste treatment and depollution services includes the treatment of radioactive and other waste of contaminated soil; cleaning up of pollution including oil spills; restoration of mining sites; and de-contamination and salination services. Also included are all other services that relate to the cleaning or restoring of the environment.

2.9.11 Agricultural, mining and on-site processing services

Agricultural, mining and on-site processing services includes agricultural services that are incidental to agriculture such as the provision of agricultural machinery with crew, harvesting, treatment of crops, pest control, animal boarding, animal care and breeding services. Services in hunting, trapping, forestry and logging and fishing are also included.

Mining services provided at oil and gas fields including drilling, derrick building, repair and dismantling services and oil and gas well casing and cementing are included. Services incidental to mineral prospecting and exploration as well as mining engineering and geological surveying are also included here.

Other on-site processing services covers on-site processing of or work on goods that have been imported without change of ownership, processed but not re-exported to the country from which the goods were consigned (but are instead either sold in the processing economy or sold to a third economy) or vice versa.

2.9.12 Other miscellaneous business services

Other miscellaneous business services covers services transactions between residents and non-residents such as placement of personnel, security and investigative services, translation and interpretation, photographic services, building cleaning, real estate services to business and any other business services that cannot be classified to any of the other business services listed above. Included are services related to the distribution of electricity, water, gas and other petroleum products.

2.9.13 Services between related enterprises n.i.e.

This is a residual category. It covers payments between related enterprises for services that cannot be specifically classified to any other component of EBOPS. It includes payments from branches, subsidiaries and associates to their parent enterprise or other related enterprises that represent contributions to the general management costs of the branches, subsidiaries and associates (for planning, organizing and controlling) and also reimbursements of expenses settled directly

by parent enterprises. Also included are transactions between parent enterprises and their branches, subsidiaries and associates to cover overhead expenses.

2.10. Personal, cultural and recreational services

This component comprises two sub-components: *Audio-visual and related services* and *other personal, cultural and recreational services*.

Audio-visual and related services comprises services and associated fees related to the production of motion pictures (on film or videotape), radio and television programs (live or tape) and musical recordings. Included are receipts or payments for rentals; fees received by resident actors, producers, and so forth for production abroad (or by non-residents for work carried out in the compiling economy); fees for distribution rights sold to the media for a limited number of showings in specified areas; and access to encrypted television channels (such as cable services).

Fees to actors, directors and producers involved with theatrical and musical productions, sporting events, circuses and other similar events and fees for distribution rights (for television, radio and film) for these activities are included. Excluded are purchases and sales of films, television and radio programmes, recorded music, musical compositions and manuscripts and the rights to these (because purchases and sales of merchandise and assets are not within the scope of EBOPS). Also excluded are the sale of rights of video editions of films and television programmes (included in the memorandum item audiovisual transactions).

Other personal, cultural and recreational services includes services such as those associated with museums, libraries and other cultural and sporting and recreational activities. Two separate items beyond the detail of the BPM5 have been identified: education services and health services. *Education services* comprises services supplied between resident and non-residents relating to education such as correspondence courses, and education through television and the internet as well as through teachers and similar who provide services directly in the host country.

Health services comprises services provided by doctors, nurses and paramedical and similar people as well as laboratory and similar services whether rendered remotely or on-site. Excluded is all expenditure by travellers on education and health (travel).

2.11. Government services not included elsewhere (n.i.e.)

Government services n.i.e. is a residual category covering government transactions (including those of international organizations) not contained in other components of the EBOPS classification. Included are all transactions (in both goods and services) by embassies, consulates, military units and defence agencies with residents of economies in which the embassies, consulates, military units and defence agencies are located and all transactions with other economies. Excluded are transactions with residents of the home economies represented by the embassies, consulates, military units and defence agencies and transactions in the commissaries, post exchanges, and these embassies and consulates.

The recommendation of the MSITS is to sub-divide this item into *embassies and consulates* and *military units and agencies*.

ABOUT THE DATA

APPROACH TO PRESENTING THE DATA

As mentioned elsewhere, this report seeks a common approach to the production of statistics on International Trade in Services using as a basis the statistics provided for the services component of the Current Account of the Balance of Payments of CARICOM Member States. Even though the twelve Member states, for which data have been produced in this report, compile data in accordance with the BPM5, there were differences in the level of disaggregation of data across Member States. Ideally, therefore, the initial approach was to compile the statistics according to four broad service areas: Transportation, Travel, Commercial Services and Government Services not included elsewhere.

Tables 1.1.1 – 1.1.3 show a summary of services statistics by these broad service areas for the years 1993 and 2000. This was to show the change over time in receipts, payments and balance of services. The choice of 1993 was to enable the inclusion of The Bahamas since there was no information available for The Bahamas in this format for 1992. The second set of data from Tables 1.2.1-1.4.6 presents a series of data for the period 1992-2000 by Member States, individually highlighting each of the broad service areas for receipts, payments and balance of payments as well as the total receipts, payments and balances of services.

Tables 1.5.1 –1.5.13 attempt to disaggregate at the level of CARICOM and for each Member State one of the broad service areas with respect to the commercial services: insurance services, financial services and other business services, for receipts, payments and balance of services. The attempt to disaggregate the commercial services highlighted some of the problems of data coverage, accuracy and quality.

Tables 2.1.1 – 2.12.3 provide the most disaggregated data on services that are available for each Member State by receipts, payments and balance of services. This set of tables effectively shows the work that is ahead at the regional and national levels relative to movement from the BPM5 standard presentation to the more detailed EBOPS format.

Annex II shows the EBOPS format, which, if it is matched back to Belize and Barbados' more detailed presentations in Section 2, shows that these two Member States are well on the way to producing data by EBOPS.

DATA COVERAGE AND QUALITY

A thorough evaluation of this report and the developmental work that has been undertaken on the CIDA-funded project is required to comprehensively itemize coverage issues that currently exist in services and that affect the accuracy and the quality of the data. However, a close scrutiny of the data presented, the explanatory notes and, concepts and definitions provided some leads with regard to problems of coverage. In addition, a comparison of key components over time and across Member States also led to the discovery of possible coverage problems that are identified below. These issues have implications for the accuracy and quality of the data that are presented.

Problems Identified in Data Compilation

1. The definition of the *offshore enterprises* some of which comprise offshore financial companies poses some problems relative to the inclusion of information in the balance of payments. Looking at the data for The Bahamas, for example, it was evident that the data for financial services did not include the financial transactions of the offshore enterprises with the rest of the world. Only the local expenses of offshore companies are included since the offshore companies are defined by The Bahamas as non-resident and therefore services transactions between these companies and the rest of the world are treated as transactions between non-resident and non-resident entities and are excluded from the BOP. This is further justified by Member States, like The Bahamas, due to the fact that there is no overlap of these transactions with the domestic economies. According to the IMF's BPM5, offshore enterprises engaged in manufacturing processes (including assembly of components manufactured elsewhere) are residents of the economies in which the offshore enterprises are located and should be included in the BOP. This is applicable regardless of the location of these enterprises relative to special zones of exemptions from customs or other concessions and regulations and also applies to non-manufacturing operations such as trading, financial enterprises and other services. Therefore, according to this definition, the local expenses transactions ought to be excluded from the BOP. This is also the case with Barbados. Concern about the definition and treatment of offshore financial sector and other offshore companies was raised in the situational assessment and requires further investigation and standardization across the region. At present, therefore, the lack of standardization in the treatment of offshore enterprises affects the quality and the accuracy of the data on services. This is, therefore, one major area requiring common guidelines for the production of statistics of international trade in services as well as the national accounts compilation that can serve to improve data accuracy and quality at the level of Member States and regionally. This whole issue hinges on the concept of residence, which is said to be under review.
2. Under Commercial services, the sector *Financial services* was sparse for several Member States for both receipts and payments and was non-existent as a category in the case of Trinidad and Tobago. The estimate of trade in financial services appears to be very weak for most Member States. In the case of Barbados, it was obvious that efforts have been made to improve the accuracy and quality of this estimate in the post 1994 period as reflected in the high increase in 1995 over 1994..
3. In the sector *Other Business services*, which also falls under commercial services, there is need to disaggregate this component to inform of precisely what are the key services that are contained and how the estimate is derived. For example, in the case of Member States that attempted to disaggregate this component, it was obvious that there were missing estimates from areas such as *business, professional and technical services* inward while an estimation was attempted or available for the period 1990-93 only with respect to the payments side in one case. *Other business* categories such as *computer and related services* , *communication services and entertainment* were in general not disaggregated.
4. Travel is also another area, which, during our workshops, it was realized that the estimate might not be complete or accurate. This component of services reflects the

mode of delivery *consumption abroad* of tourists. In some Member States, there is need for more up to date Visitor Expenditure surveys to gauge more effectively the contribution of travel to services to strengthen the debit side of this component. Also, the absence of inward-bound surveys also affects the payments side of this sector. In addition, checks can be made on the major tourists destinations for nationals of our member states to see how much our nationals spend abroad to strengthen this estimate. The absence of exchange controls would also have affected the supply of information on business travellers and points to the need to look at alternative sources of information as suggested above. Useful discussions on Tourism Satellite Accounts have been held relative to improvement of the estimation of the contribution of tourism in the 1993 SNA. Data quality for travel is therefore affected by the problems outlined above. In addition, a breakdown of travel into personal, business and so forth was not available for most member states and this needs to be addressed in the future. While there was a breakdown in the case of Trinidad and Tobago, it will be necessary to reorient this to bring it more closely in line with the EBOPS format.

5. For transportation, the breakdown into sea, air and other were available for most member states. Based on the sources of data indicated, this data appears to be fairly reliable. However, further breakdown of these categories are required for the EBOPS format.
6. Coverage of establishments other than subsidiaries of multinationals is required in an effort to obtain information on trade in services from other enterprises.
7. There is also need for Member States to report the response rates, as is the case for Barbados, for the various surveys that are utilised in collecting information so that a better idea can be obtained of the quality of the estimates of services that are produced. In addition, more details should be furnished relative to the methods of estimation for missing data and in general more information on their methodologies and sources of data.

DATA HIGHLIGHTS

1. CARICOM- Services by Broad Service Areas - 1993-2000

1.1 Total Receipts of Services

With the exception of missing data for Guyana and Suriname, total receipts of services for twelve CARICOM Member States was \$US6.98 billion in 2000 compared to a figure of \$US4.88 billion in 1993. This represents an annual average growth rate of 5.2% in the receipts of services for this period 1993-2000. MDCs' total receipts of services stood at \$US3.59 billion in 2000 or 51.5% of the total, while the corresponding figure for LDCs was \$US1.36 billion or 19.5%, of which the OECS sub-region contributed \$US1.2 billion or 17.2%. The Bahamas contributed 29% of total receipts of services in 2000. The annual growth in receipts of services was 6% for the MDCs, 3.9% for the LDCs and 4.5% for the OECS Member States.

The percentage change in total receipts of services was 2.9% in 2000 as compared to an increase of 7.3% in 1999. The Bahamas experienced a growth of 6.8% in services receipts in 2000 as compared to 23.5% in 1999. There was a decline in services receipts in 2000 in the OECS Member States of 4.1% as compared to an increase in 1999 of 6.8%. Main contributors to the decline in services receipts in the OECS in 2000 were Antigua and Barbuda and Saint Lucia with decreases of 5.5% and 3.9% respectively.

Travel contributed \$US5.05 billion to total receipts of services in 2000 or 72.4%. This is the most significant component of services receipts and effectively reflects the impact of tourism in the economies of Member States, except in the case of Trinidad and Tobago where transportation equalled or surpassed travel in importance. This was followed by commercial services with \$US1.04 billion or 14.9% and transportation with \$US733.9 million. In 1993 travel contributed \$US3.60 billion or 73.8%; Commercial services contributed \$US609.6 million (12.5%) and transportation, \$US517.8 million (10.6%). The annual growth rate for the period 1993-2000 was 4.9% for travel, 8% for commercial services and 5.1% for transportation. The proportions for 1993 largely were similar to the contribution for 2000.

The Bahamas contributed to 35.9% of the total travel receipts in 2000, with Jamaica being the second highest contributor with 26.4%. Antigua and Barbuda was the highest contributor to total travel receipts in 2000 for the OECS sub-region with 5.8% followed by Saint Lucia with 5.5%.

For transportation, Jamaica, followed by Trinidad and Tobago, was the highest contributor to total receipts for this category in 2000 with 44.8% and 28.3% respectively. Barbados recorded a contribution of 29.5% of commercial services in 2000 followed by Jamaica with 24.1%. This order was reversed for government services n.i.e. with Jamaica contributing 24.7% in 2000 while Barbados contributed 22.9%. Generally this component reflects freight receipts based on merchandise trade and passenger airfares.

Barbados was the main contributor to commercial services in 2000 with 29.5% followed by Jamaica with 24.1% and The Bahamas and Trinidad and Tobago with approximately 12% each.

Generally the trend in 1993 relative to the distribution of total receipts by Member States seems to be similar to what exists in 2000.

1.2 Total Payments of Services

Total payments of services for the twelve Member States stood at \$US3.97 billion in 2000 as compared to \$US2.50 billion in 1993. The annual growth rate in payments of services for the period 1993-2000 was 6.9%. MDCs' total payments of services was \$US2.29 billion in 2000 up from \$US1.43 billion in 1993 reflecting an annual growth rate of 6.9% for this period. MDCs contributed to 57.5% of the total payments of services for the region in 2000 with the contribution of LDCs being 17.9% and the OECS sub-region, 14.3%. In 2000, Jamaica and the Bahamas accounted for 35.5% and 24.6% of total payments of services, respectively.

Total payments of services increased by 6% in 2000 as compared to an increase of 2.3% in 1999. The increase in total payments of services in MDCs was 12% in 2000 as compared to 2.8% in 1999. Trinidad and Tobago reflected an increase of 41.5% in total payments in 2000 as compared to 5.4% in 1999. Belize also showed significant increases in payments of services of 17.9% and 25.9% in 2000 and 1999 respectively. The Bahamas recorded an increase of 1.9% in services payments in 2000 following a decrease of 3.3% in 1999. For the OECS Member States the overall change in 2000 showed a decline of 9.3% in services payments as compared to an increase of 6.5% in 1999. With the exception of Grenada all of the OECS Member States reflected decreases in services payments in 2000. In 1999, only Montserrat and St. Vincent and the Grenadines recorded decreases in services payments among the OECS Member States.

Commercial services was the highest contributor to total payments of services for the CARICOM Region in 2000 with \$US1.55 billion or 39%. In 2000, transportation accounted for \$US1.35 billion of total payment of services or 34%, travel, \$US883.8 million or 22.2% and government services n.i.e., \$US186.8 million or 4.7%. Jamaica followed by The Bahamas was the highest contributor to total payments of commercial services with proportions of 38.3% and 29.6% respectively. Jamaica contributed 42.6% of the total transportation payments in 2000, followed by Trinidad and Tobago with 12.8%. The Bahamas (33.1%), Jamaica (23.6%) and Trinidad and Tobago (16.6%) accounted for the highest proportions of total payments of travel services.

1.3 Balance of Services

Generally, CARICOM appears to be experiencing positive balances on its total trade in services, based on the current data available. The balance on international trade in services as recorded in the current account of the Balance of Payments of Member States ranged from \$US2.39 billion in 1993 to \$US3.01 billion in 2000. These figures also exclude Suriname and Guyana. Travel was the main contributor to the positive balance on trade in services with balances ranging from \$US3.12 billion in 1993 to \$US4.17 billion in 2000. Transportation and commercial services recorded negative balances for all the years 1993-2000. Government services n.i.e. recorded negative balances for the period 1993-2000 with the exception of 1993 (\$US14.4 million), 1995 (\$US1.9 million) and 1998 (\$US19.3 million).

2. Details of Trade in Services by Member States

Antigua and Barbuda

Receipts of services for Antigua and Barbuda moved from \$US332.3 million in 1992 to \$US414.8 million in 2000, an annual growth rate of 2.8% for the period. Travel accounted for over 66% of total receipts for the entire period. Transportation recorded a contribution of 18.2% in

1992, 19.2% in 1995 and 15.4% in 2000. Air transport was the major contributor to this category of services contributing over 85% for most years.

The contribution of commercial services to total receipts of services for Antigua and Barbuda moved from under 10% in the period 1992-95 to a high of 18.3% of the total in 1999 and 12.4% in 2000. Financial services reflected a small proportional contribution of commercial services for the years for which data were available. Insurance services and *other services* were the main contributors to commercial services. Total receipts of services fell in 2000 by 5.5% for Antigua and Barbuda. In 1999 receipts of services increased by 3.1%.

Total payments of services moved from \$US124.7 million in 1992 to \$US164.3 million in 2000, which reflects an annual growth rate of 3.5% for the period 1992-2000. For the period 1992-94, transportation accounted for the highest proportion of payments of services for Antigua and Barbuda with 41.1% in 1992, 39.4% in 1993 and 41.3% in 1994. Sea transport exceeded the contribution of air transport for the entire period. From 1995-2000, commercial services became the leading contributor to payments of services with proportions such as 44.7% in 1996, and 41.3% in 2000. Other services and insurance services comprised the majority of the commercial services payments category. Travel contributed over 15% to total payments of services for the entire period, with the proportion for 2000 being 18.7%. Total payments of services fell by 10.4% in 2000. In 1999, total payments of services increased by 5.6%.

Similar to the regional level, the balance of services was positive for all the years with the main contributor to this positive trend being the balance of services with respect to travel.

The Bahamas

For the purpose of this report, data for The Bahamas starts from 1993. Total Receipts of Services moved from \$US1.46 billion in 1993 to \$US2.02 billion in 2000, an annual rate of growth of 4.8%. Travel contributed 88.9% in 1993 and 89.7% in 2000 and was over 83% for all the remaining years. In the area of receipts of commercial services, the category, *Offshore companies local expenses* contributed to the majority of these receipts. However in 1999 the contribution of insurance services exceeded that of *offshore companies local expenses*. As noted elsewhere, the transactions of the offshore companies with non-residents are not incorporated in the balance of payments since these are not treated as resident to non-resident transactions but as non-resident to non-resident transactions. Total receipts of services increased by 6.8% in 2000. In 1999, total receipts of services increased by 23.5%.

Total payments of services moved from \$US567.4 million in 1993 to \$US975.4 million in 2000, reflecting an annual growth rate of 8.1% for the period. Commercial services and travel were the highest components of payments of services. Commercial services contributed over 40% to payments of services for all the years of the period with the exception of 1996 with 38.9%. The contribution in 2000 was 47.1%. With the exception of 1998 with a contribution of 25.8% and 29.5% in 1997, travel contributed 30% and over for the remaining years of the period 1993-2000. Transportation accounted for over 17% of total payments of services for all the years. In 1997, the proportional contribution of transportation was 22.8%, the highest contribution for the period, followed by 21.8% in 1996. In 2000, total payments of services increased by 1.8% as compared to a decline of 3.3% in 1999.

Balance of services stood at \$US1.05 billion in 2000 from \$US891.7 million in 1993. Travel contributed significantly to this positive balance of services. Transportation, commercial and government services n.i.e all reflected negative balances of services for the entire period.

Barbados

Data for Barbados spans the period 1990-2000. Total receipts of services was \$US1.09 billion in 2000 as compared to \$US653.9 million in 1990. The rate of growth for the period 1990-2000 was 5.2%. Travel contributed over 71% of total receipts of services for the period 1990-1996. This contribution fell under 70% for the period 1997-2000 but still remained significant. *Personal travel*, in particular *tourists*, accounted for the majority of the travel expenses. Commercial services contributed over 17% of total receipts for the period 1990-93 and over 20% for the period 1994-2000. Significant categories contributing to commercial services are: under *Insurance services-life insurance and pension funds*; other services-*communication services*, *Merchandising and other trade related services* and *miscellaneous services*. Total receipts in 2000 increased by 5.9% as compared to 5.6% in 1999.

Total payments of services moved from \$US250.1 million to \$US487.4 million, an annual rate of growth of 6.9% during this period. Transportation and commercial services were the services products that contributed significantly to total payments. In 1990-92, transportation was the most significant contributor to total payments of services for Barbados with proportions of over 37 %. For the remaining years the contribution of transportation, while not as high as the 1990-1992 period, was always over 30%. *Air transport* was the main component of transportation payments of services. Commercial services was the most significant contributor to total payments of services for the years 1993-2000 ranging from 39.9% in 1993 to 44.8% in 1994. *Insurance services, royalty and license fees, management fees and merchandising and other trade related services* formed the key components of payments of commercial services. Travel contributed over 18% of total payments of services for the entire period 1990-2000. Total payments of services increased by 6.4% in 2000 as compared to 6% in 1999.

Travel, commercial and government services n.i.e. reflected positive balance of services for the period 1990-2000 with travel being the most significant contributor to this positive balance.

Belize

Belize's total receipts of services was \$US125.8 million in 1990 as compared to \$US159.8 million in 2000, reflecting an annual growth rate of 2.4% for this period. Travel (personal) was also the highest contributor to total receipts of services for Belize with proportions of over 35% for the period 1990-1994 and over 64% for the remaining years. The proportional contribution for 2000 was 73.7% of total receipts of services. Commercial services contributed 28.4% in 1990 20.6% in 1995 with a decrease in the proportion in 2000 to 8.4%.

Payment of services was \$US66.3 million in 1990, moving to \$US79.8 million in 1995 and \$US142.4 million in 2000, at an annual growth rate of 7.9%. Transportation (sea transport-freight) was the most significant contributor to total payments of services with a proportion as high as 49.6% in 1991 and 38.5% in 2000. Travel and commercial services also contributed substantially to total payments of services. Travel contributing 31% in 1995 and 28.4% in 2000. Commercial services had their most significant proportions in 1997 and 1998 with 34.6% and 34.5% respectively. *Miscellaneous business, professional and technical* category was a significant contributor to the payment of commercial services for the period 1995-2000.

Balance of services showed a general declining trend from \$US59.5 million in 1990 to \$US17.2 million in 2000. Transportation reflected negative balances of payments for the entire period 1990-2000, while travel recorded positive balances of payments for the same period. Commercial services had positive balances for the period 1990-1996 and negative balances for the period 1997-2000. The balances on commercial services moved from a positive balance of \$US13.0 million in 1990 to a negative balance of \$US24.9 million.

Dominica

Total receipts of services increased steadily from \$US42.4 million in 1992 to \$US88.0 million in 2000. The annual growth rate for receipts of services for the period is 9.6%. Travel contributed over 60% of total receipt of services from 1992-96, with this proportion decreasing to 49.4% in 1999. The contribution of travel in 2000 was 53.6%. Commercial services also contributed significantly to total receipts of services with the proportions for 1992-97 ranging from 22.7% to 29%. The contribution of commercial services to total receipts of services for 1998-2000 ranged from 34.9% to 39.3% (1999). Receipts of services declined by 11% in 2000 as compared to an increase of 11.9% in 1999.

Total payments of services for Dominica increased from \$US32.2 million in 1992 to \$US50.6 million in 2000, an annual rate of growth of 5.8%. Transportation and commercial services were the most significant contributors respectively to the payments of services with the order being reversed for 1995 and 1999. Transportation contributed 53% in 1992 declining to approximately 35% in 1998 and 1999 before moving to 42.9% in 2000. There was a decline of 14.7% in the total payments of services for Dominica in 2000, compared to an increase of 9.8% in 1999.

The balance of services for Dominica increased from \$US10.2 million in 1992 to \$US37.5 million in 2000. Transportation and government services n.i.e. recorded negative balances for the entire period, while travel and commercial services (with the exception of 1995) reflected positive balances of services.

Grenada

Total receipts of services for Grenada moved from \$US76.0 million in 1992 to \$US151.3 million in 2000. This reflected an annual rate of growth of 9% for this period. Travel was the significant contributor to total receipts for the period with proportions exceeding 72% for the period 1992-97. There was a decline in the contribution of travel to total receipts of services during the period 1998-2000 as compared to the earlier period. The contribution of travel in 2000 was 61.1% in 2000. Commercial services followed travel as the next significant contributor to total receipts of services with proportions of over 20% in 1992, 1993, 1996-2000. The proportions for 1999 and 2000 were 33.9% and 30.9% respectively. In 2000, there was an increase of 1.9% in total receipts of services while in 1999 the increase in receipts of services for Grenada was approximately 24%.

Total payments of services for Grenada moved from \$US35.4 million in 1992 to \$US83.3 million in 2000, an annual rate of increase of 11.3% for the period. Transportation and commercial services accounted substantially to total payments of services for the period. The contribution of transportation was 50.6% in 1992, 55.8% in 1996 and 41.1% in 2000. Commercial services contributed 32% in 1992, increasing to 47.5% in 1999 and was 44.8% in 2000. The rate of increase of payments of services was 6.1% in 2000 as compared to an increase of 13.3% in 1999.

The balance of services for Grenada was \$US40.6 million in 1992 moving to \$US68 million in 2000. Travel contributed significantly to this positive balance of services for Grenada. Commercial services also positively affected the balance of services. Transportation recorded negative balance of services for the entire period.

Jamaica

Total receipts of services was \$US1.16 billion in 1990 moving to \$US1.95 billion in 2000. The annual growth rate for the period was 5.4%. Travel contributed between 64-70% of total receipts of services for the entire period. Transportation and commercial services contributed between 25% and 31% of total receipts of services for the period. *Passenger fares* accounted for the greatest proportion of receipts of transportation, while *communication services* and *computer and related services* were key contributors of commercial services. The rate of increase of total receipts was 5.5% in 2000 as compared to 4.4% in 1999.

Total payments of services for Jamaica was \$US715.9 million in 1990 and moved to \$US1.41 billion in 2000. The annual rate of growth for the period 1990-2000 was 7%. Transportation and commercial services jointly contributed 88.2% of payments of services in 1990 and over 80% for the remaining years. *Freight* payments were a major component of transportation. *Insurance services*, *communication* and *other business services* were key components of commercial services. The rate of increase of payments of services was 7.9% in 2000. The increase in 1999 was 1.1%.

The balance of services was \$US439.8 million in 1990 moving to \$US538.6 million in 2000. Travel was the main contributor to this balance of services position with positive balances for the period. Transportation and commercial services reflected negative balances of services for the entire period.

Montserrat

The receipt of services was \$US 19.8 million in 1992 and declined to \$US15.7 million in 2000 reflecting an annual rate of decline of 2.9%. Travel contributed 69.2% of total receipts of services in 1992 and was over 70% for the next three years. The contribution of travel declined to 54% in 1996 and was under 40% in 1997 and 1999. Commercial services contributed to 23.2% of total receipts of services in 1992 and after falling to 20% or under for the next three years, the contribution increased to over 50% for the period 1997-99 being more significant than travel for this period as a contributor to total services receipts.

Total payments of services stood at \$US12.3 million in 1992 and was \$US 18.7 million in 2000. This reflected an annual rate of growth of 5.4% for the period. Transportation accounted for the majority of these payments for the period 1992-96 with proportions such as 53.8% in 1992, 47.3% in 1995, and 38.1% in 1996. The contribution of transportation to payment of services fell to 13.9% in 1998 and was 19.6% in 2000. Travel reflected relatively high contributions to payment of services for the years 1993-95 with approximately 23%. Commercial services recorded contributions of over 21% to total payments from 1992-95. In 1997, commercial services had the highest contribution to total payments of services with 38.6%. Government services n.i.e. recorded proportions of 61.6% in 1998, 42.2% in 1999 and 44.5% in 2000.

Balance of services was negative for the years 1996 and 1998-2000. Government services and transportation recorded negative balances, contributing to the negative balances of services for this period. Travel balance fell from double-digit figures in the period 1992-1995 to under \$US8 million for the period 1996-2000. Travel was the most significant contributor to the positive balance of services for the years 1992-95.

St Kitts and Nevis

Total receipts of services was \$US79.8 million in 1992 and stood at \$US96.7 million in 2000. The annual growth rate was 2.4% for the period 1992-2000. Travel was clearly the highest contribution to receipts of services with proportions of over 83% for the years 1992-94, 77.7% in 1995, falling to 60.2% in 2000. Total receipts of services fell by 2.8% in 2000 which followed a decline of 5.5% in 1999.

Total payments of services for St. Kitts and Nevis was \$US41.0 million in 1992 as compared with \$US74.3 million in 2000. This reflected an annual growth rate of 7.7% for the period 1992-2000. Commercial services followed by transportation were the two key contributors to payments of services totalling over 80% for the entire period. Total payments of services fell by 12.9% in 2000 following an increase of 37.8% in 1999.

The balance of services moved from \$US38.8 million in 1992 to a high of \$US47.5 million in 1994. In 1999, the balance of services recorded its lowest level for the period, \$US14.2 million, followed by \$US22.3 million in 2000, the second lowest balance. Travel recorded positive balances for the entire period and was mainly responsible for the positive total balance of services position. Transportation and commercial services exhibited negative balance of services for the entire period.

Saint Lucia

Saint Lucia's total receipts of services stood at \$US195.3 million in 1992 and \$US308.5 million in 2000. The annual growth rate for the period was 5.9%. Travel effectively comprises the largest share of total receipts of services for Saint Lucia, contributing over 84% to receipts of services for the period with a peak of 89.7% in 2000. Total receipts of services declined by 3.9% in 2000 which followed an increase of 2.3% in 1999.

Total payments of services was \$US89.3 million in 1992, moving to \$US118.2 million in 2000, an annual growth rate of 4.1 percent. Payments of services due to transportation and commercial services comprise approximately 70% of the Total. In 2000, transportation and commercial services jointly accounted for approximately 65% of total payments of Services. There was a decline of 11.2% in payments of services in 2000 and an increase of 2.9% in 1999.

The balance of services reflected positive balances throughout the period due to the contribution of the travel component. Transportation, commercial services and government n.i.e. were negative for the entire period.

St Vincent and the Grenadines

St. Vincent and the Grenadines recorded total receipts of services of \$US58.9 million in 1992 as compared with a total of \$US126.2 million in 2000. This implies an annual growth rate of 10% for the period. Travel was also the main contributor to total receipts of services for the period with proportions of over 60% for most years. There was a negligible increase in total receipts of services in 2000, compared with an increase of 17.4% in 1999.

Total payments of services was \$US44.8 million in 1992 moving to \$US59.8 million in 2000, an annual growth rate of 3.7%. Commercial services and transportation effectively contributed significantly to payments of services for this period, jointly contributing over 80% for most years with the contributions of 1994, 1999 and 2000 falling to just under 80%. Total payments of services fell by 10.1% in 2000 and by 15.8% in 1999.

Balance of services moved from \$US14.1 million in 1992 and increased to \$US66.4 million in 2000. Responsible for this increase in the services balance were increases in the balance on travel and positive balances in commercial services for the years 1999 and 2000.

Trinidad and Tobago

Total receipts of services for Trinidad and Tobago were \$US337.0 million in 1990, \$US415.6 million in 1995 and \$US554.7 million in 2000. The annual growth for the period 1990-2000 was 5.1%. Transportation exhibited the highest share of receipts of services for most of the years accounting for 47.9% in 1990, 55.8% in 1993, with the share however declining to under 40% for the period 1998-2000. *Passenger fares* was the most significant contributor under transportation.

With the exception of 1995 (17.5%), travel contributed over 22% of receipts of services for the period and in fact, reflected the highest share in 1999 and 2000 with 34.7% and 38.4% respectively. The category of *visitors, private homes and others* was a key component of travel with increases of approximately 50% in the post 1996 period as compared to the value of this category in 1996. Commercial services reflected the second highest contributor for 1991 (30.1%), 1992 (27.9%), 1995 (32.7%), and 1996 (31%). Total receipts of services declined by 8% in 2000 and by 10.5% in 1999.

Payments of services was \$US340.2 million in 1990, \$US256.5 million in 1995 and \$US387.7 million in 2000. The annual growth rate for the period 1990-2000 was 1.3%. Transportation and travel accounted for the highest amounts of these payments interchangeably for the period 1990-93. From 1994, transportation clearly reflected the highest shares of payments of services with proportions such as 37% in 1995, 47.8% in 1998 and 44.7% in 2000. Commercial services while reflecting relatively significant shares of services payments from 1990-1995 and 1997, the proportional contribution fell to under 20% for the remaining years.

The balance of services was mainly positive for the period moving from \$US67.3 million in 1991 to a high of \$US413.7 million in 1998 before dropping to \$US167 million in 2000. 1990 was the only year where a negative balance was recorded. Transportation recorded positive balances for the entire period and was mainly responsible for the positive balance of services from 1991-1994. The period 1996-2000 saw positive balances in all the major areas, except government services which was positive only in 1998.

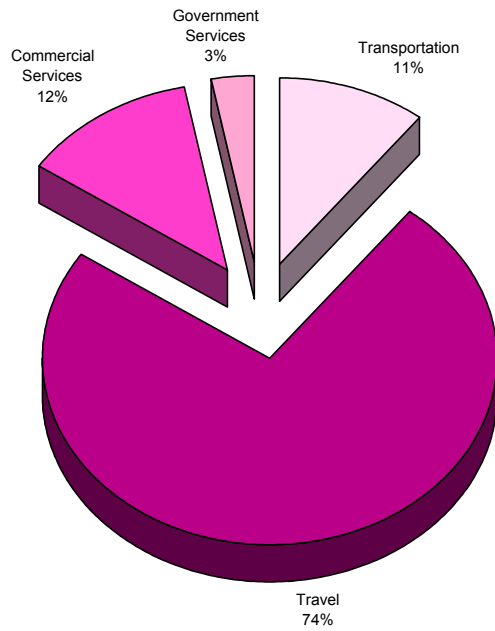

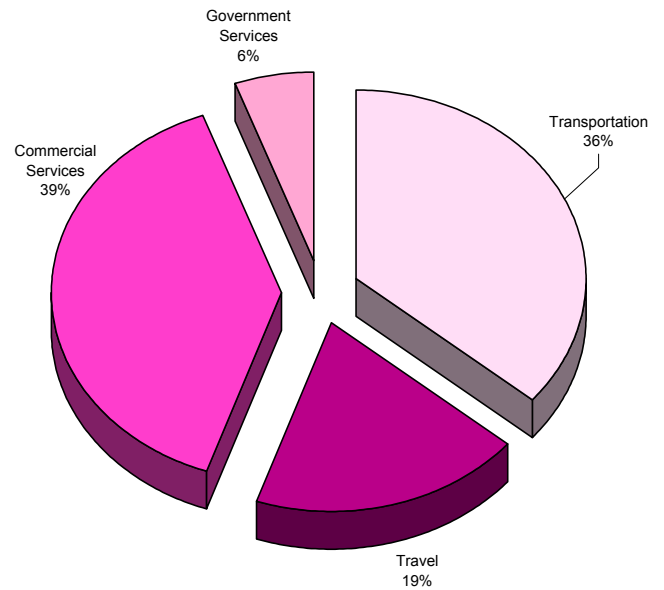

Figure 1.1: Distribution of CARICOM Receipt of Services, By Broad Service Area: 1993



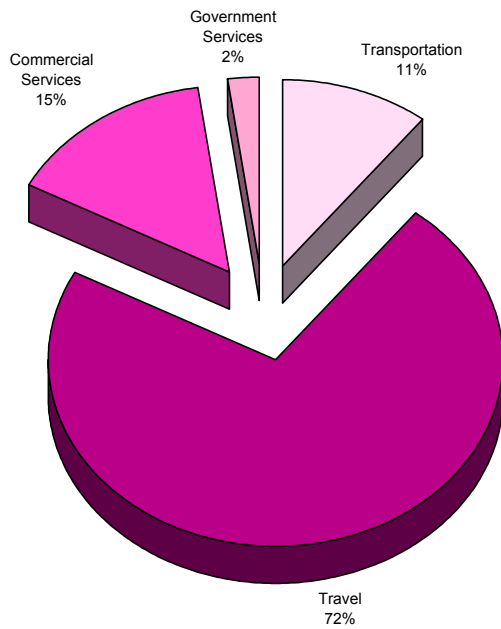

Figure 1.2: Distribution of CARICOM Payment of Services, By Broad Service Area: 1993



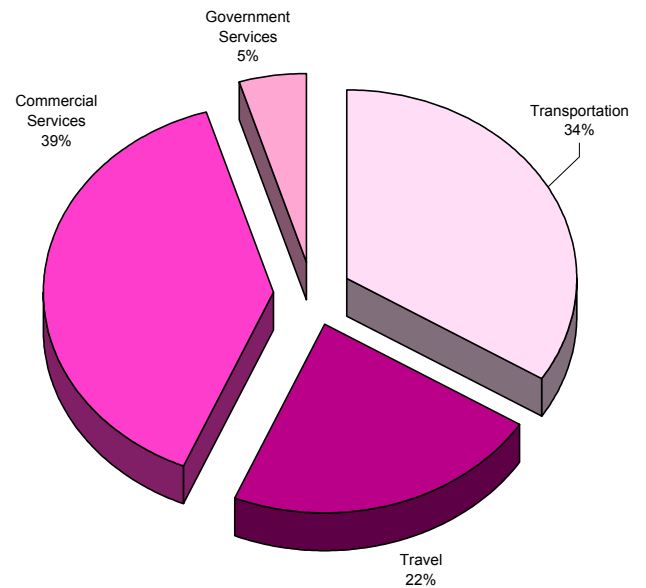

Figure 1.5: CARICOM Member States' Total Receipt of Services: 1992, 1995 & 2000

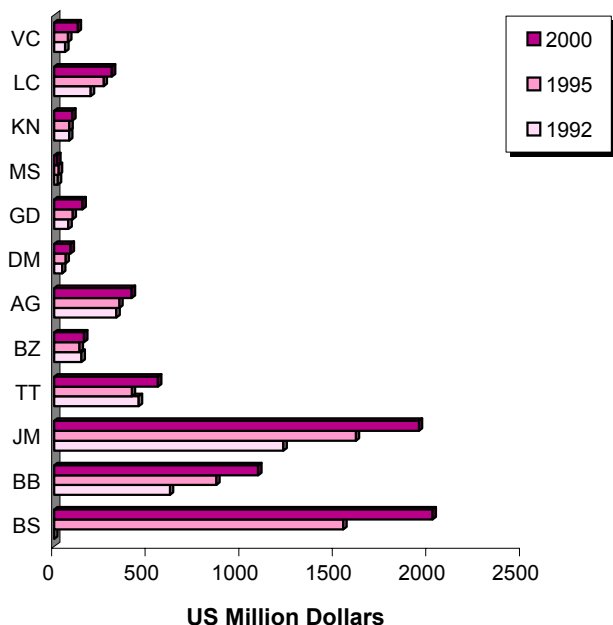


Figure 1.6: Proportions of CARICOM's Total Receipt of Services: 1992-2000

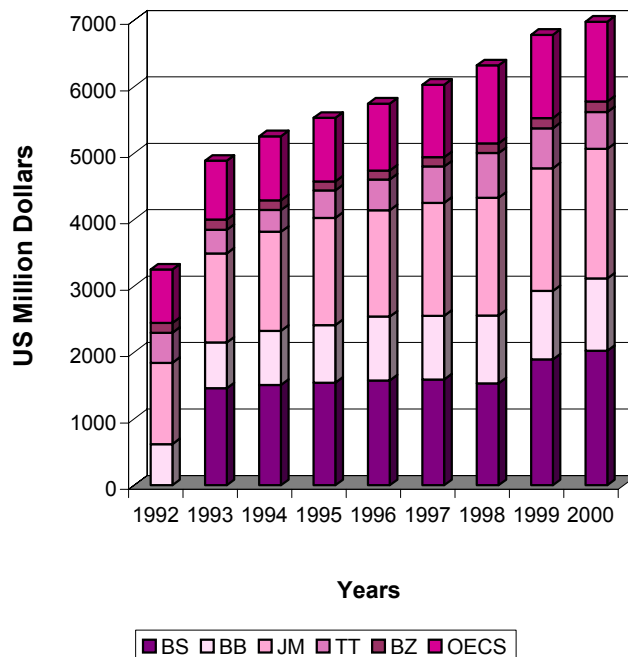


Figure 1.7: CARICOM Member States' Receipt of Services by Broad Service Area: 2000

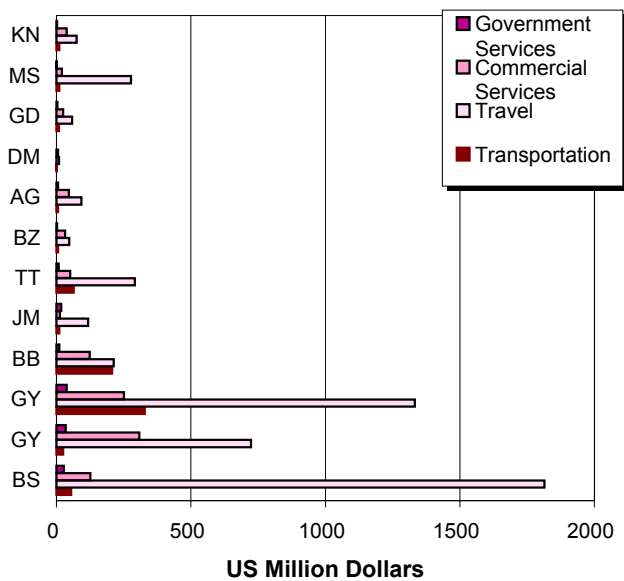


Figure 1.8: Selected Member State's Share of CARICOM's Total Receipt of Services: 2000

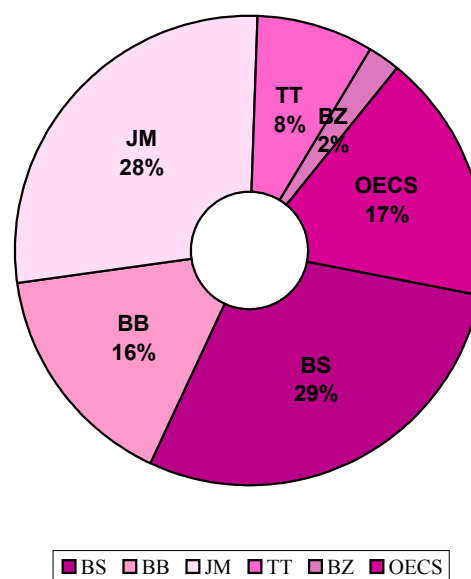

Figure 1.9: CARICOM, MDCs, LDCs & The Bahamas' Receipts of Services - Transportation: 1992-2000

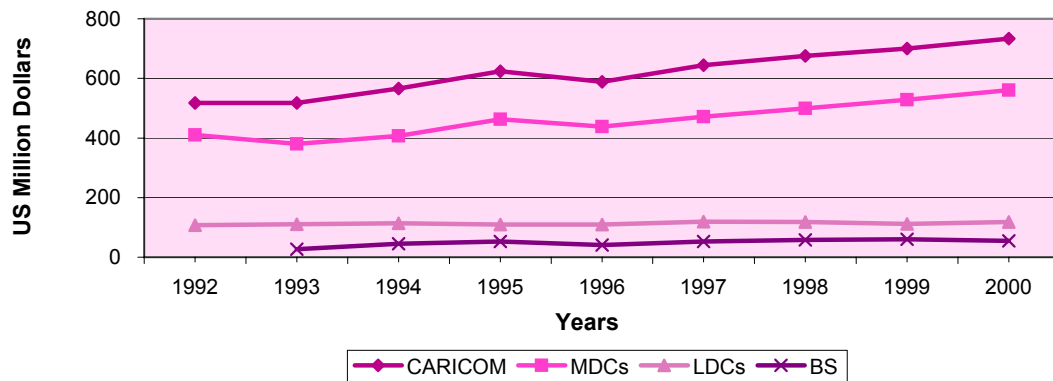


Figure 1.10: MDCs' Receipt of Services - Transportation: 1992-2000

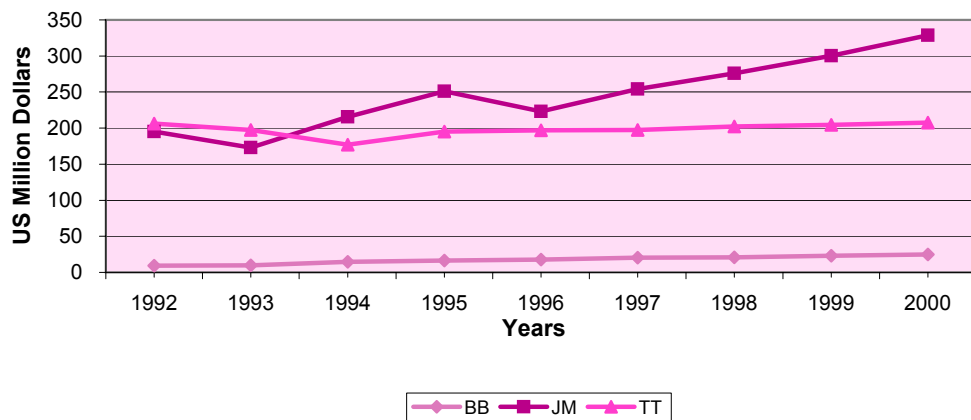


Figure 1.11: LDCs' Receipt of Services - Transportation: 1992-2000

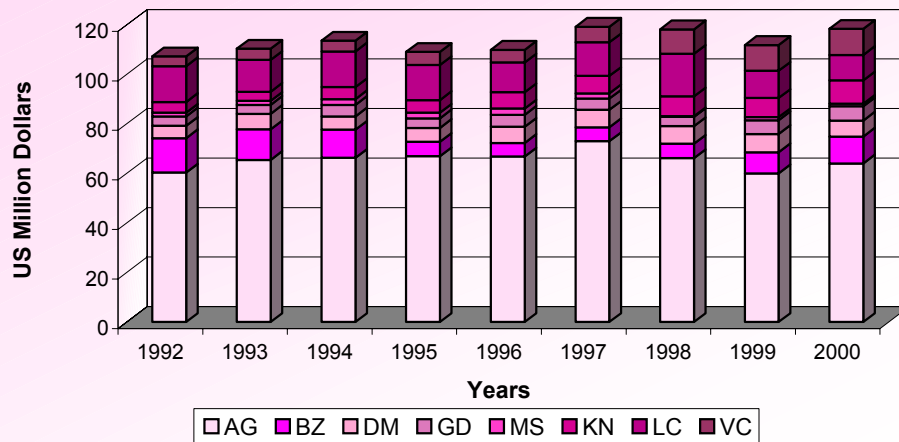

Figure 1.12: CARICOM, MDCs, LDCs & The Bahamas' Receipt of Services - Travel: 1992-2000

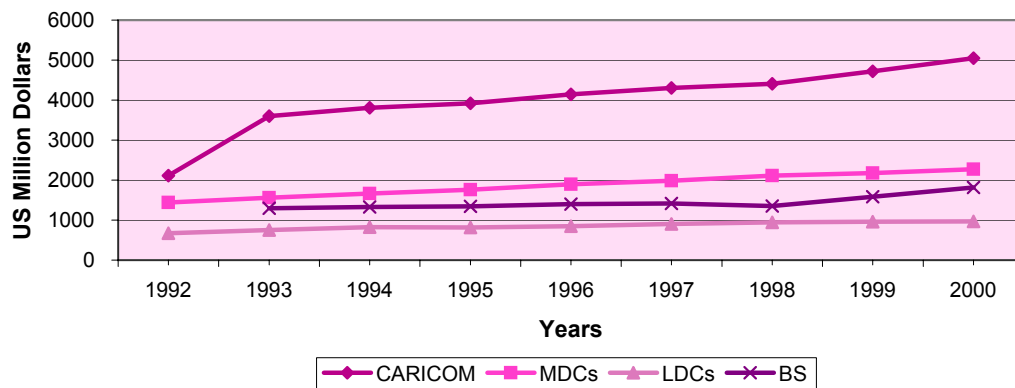


Figure 1.13: MDCs' Receipt of Services - Travel: 1992-2000

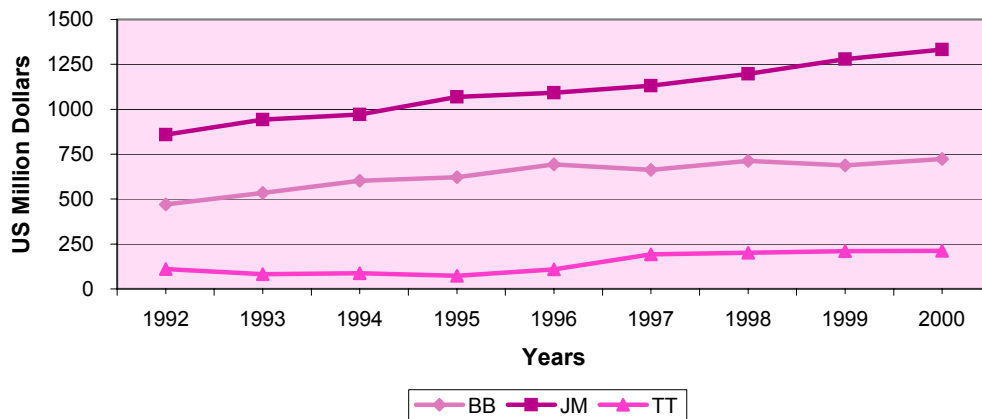


Figure 1.14: LDCs' Receipt of Services - Travel: 1992-2000

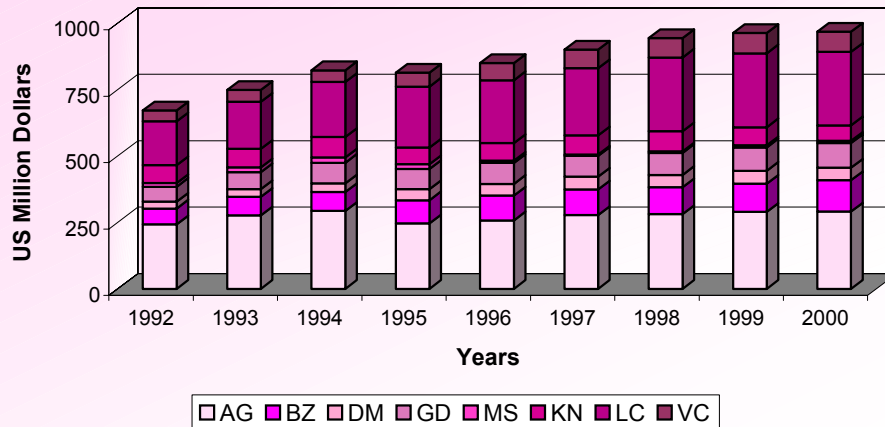

Figure 1.15: CARICOM, MDCs, LDCs & The Bahamas' Receipt of Services - Commercial Services: 1992-2000

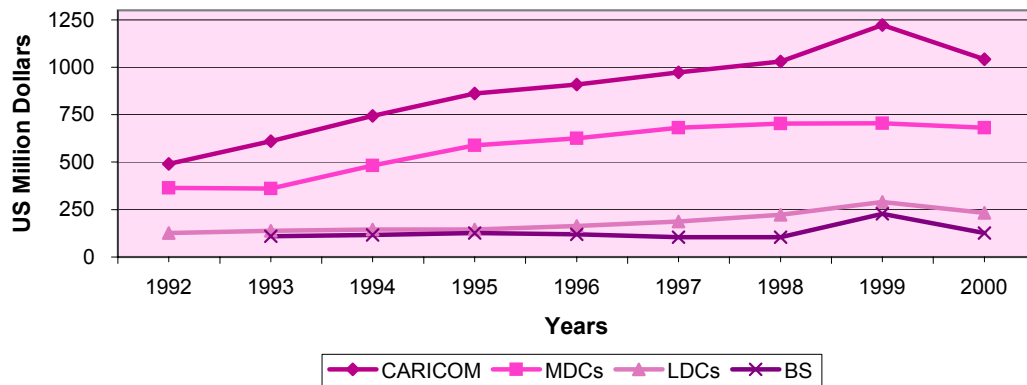


Figure 1.16: MDCs' Receipt of Services - Commercial Services: 1992-2000

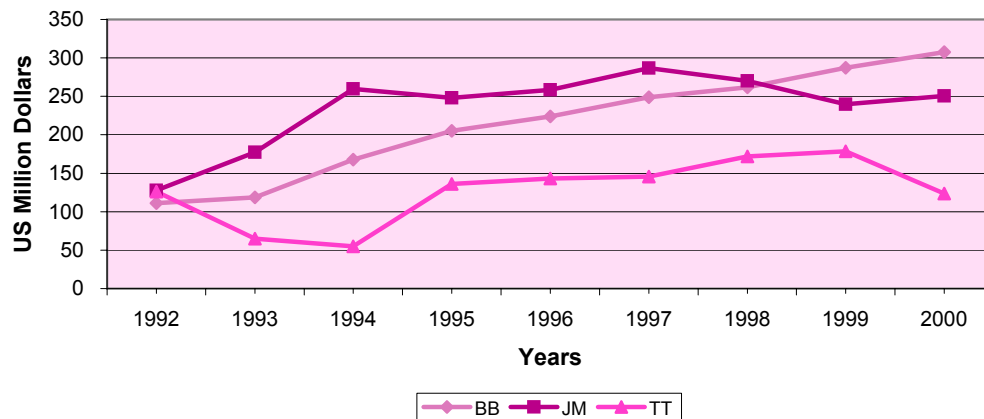


Figure 1.17: LDCs' Receipt of Services - Commercial Services: 1992-2000

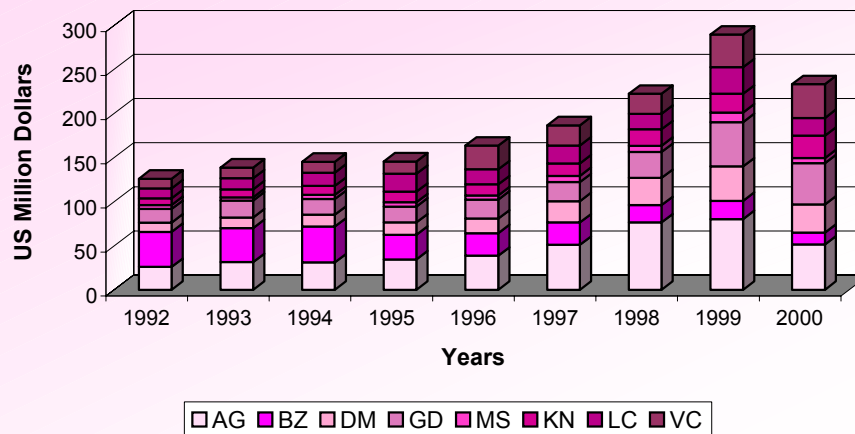

Figure 1.18: CARICOM, MDCs, LDCs & The Bahamas' Receipt of Services - Government Services: 1992-2000

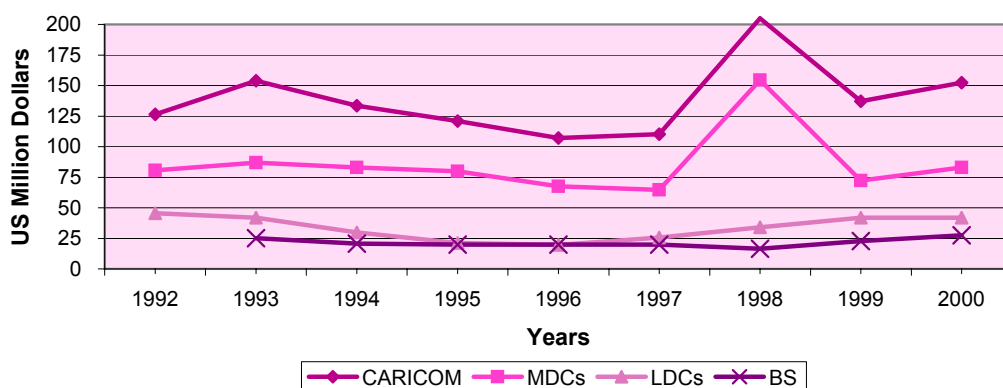


Figure 1.19: MDCs' Receipt of Services - Government Services: 1992-2000

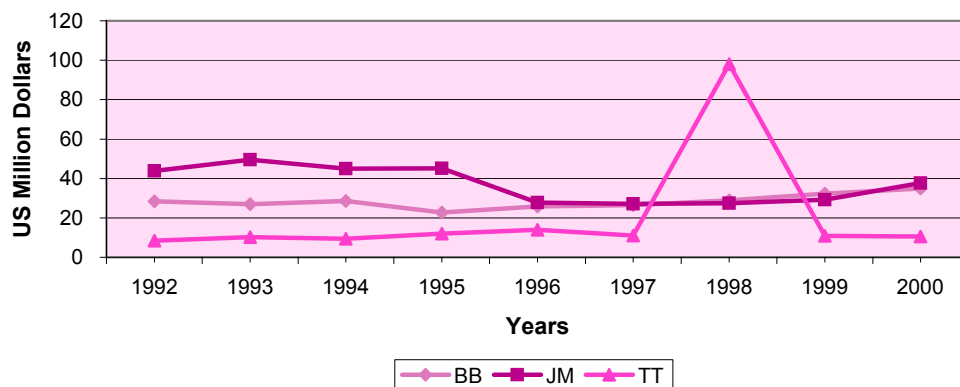


Figure 1.20: LDCs' Receipt of Services - Government Services: 1992-2000

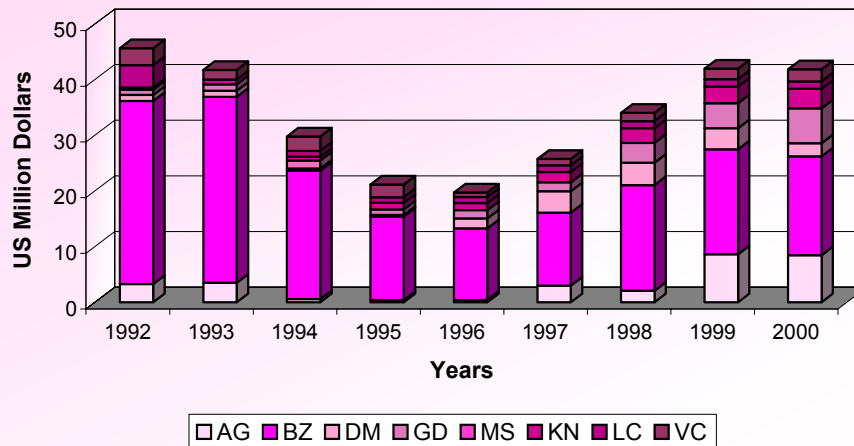

Figure 1.21: CARICOM Member States Total Payment of Services: 1992, 1995 & 2000

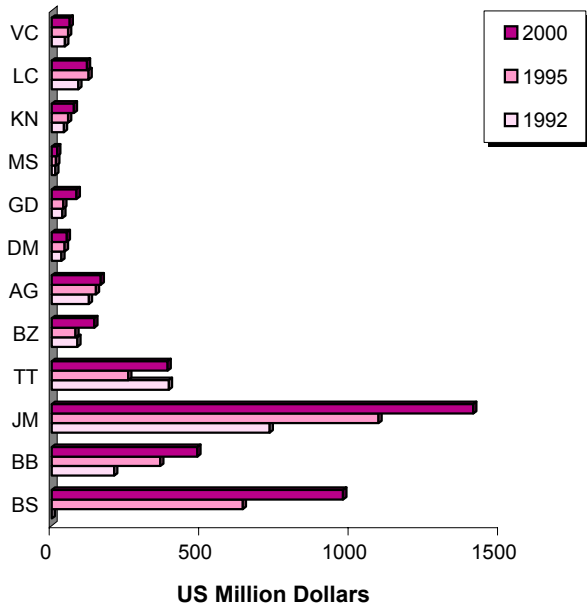


Figure 1.22: Proportions of CARICOM's Total Payment of Services: 1992-2000

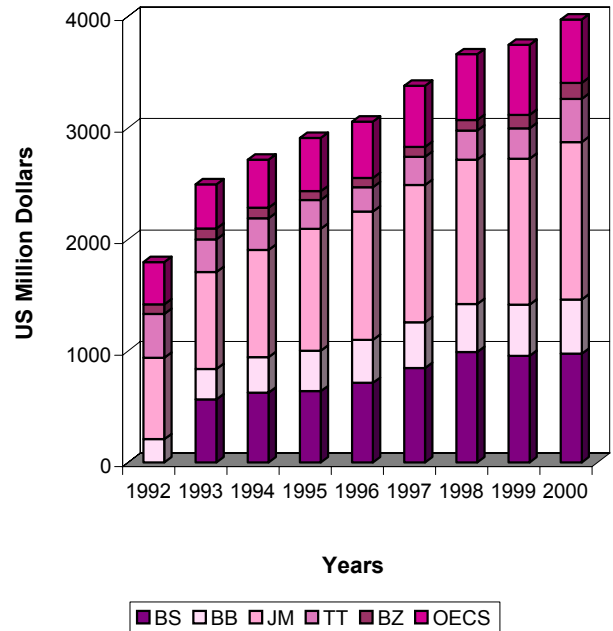


Figure 1.23: CARICOM Member States' Payment of Services by Broad Service Area: 2000

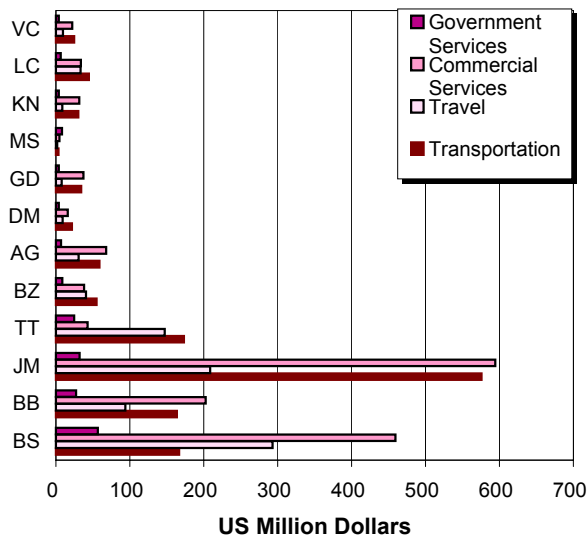


Figure 1.24: Selected Member State's Share of CARICOM's Total Payment of Services: 2000

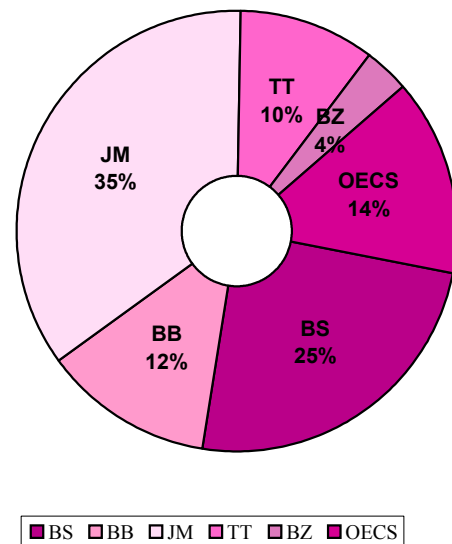

Figure 1.25: CARICOM, MDCs, LDCs & The Bahamas' Payment of Services - Transportation: 1992-2000

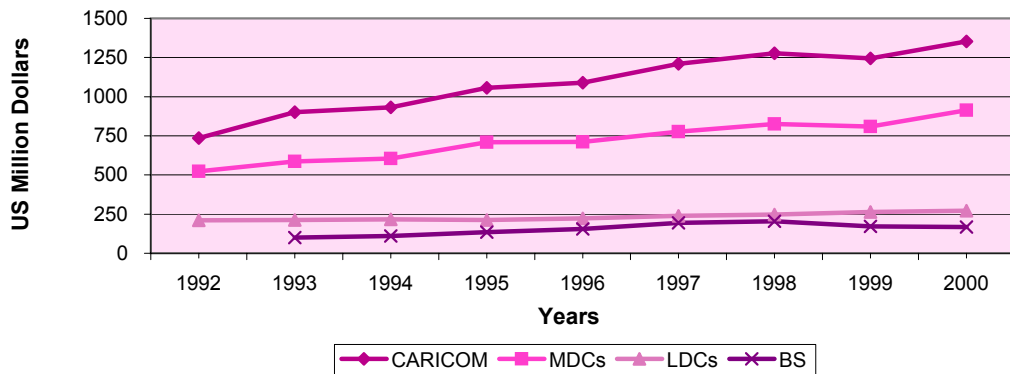


Figure 1.26: MDCs' Payment of Services - Transportation: 1992-2000

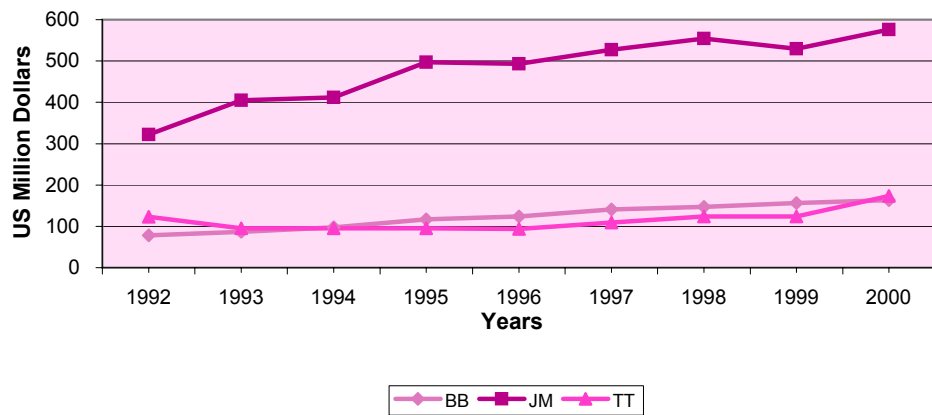


Figure 1.27: LDCs' Payment of Services - Transportation: 1992-2000

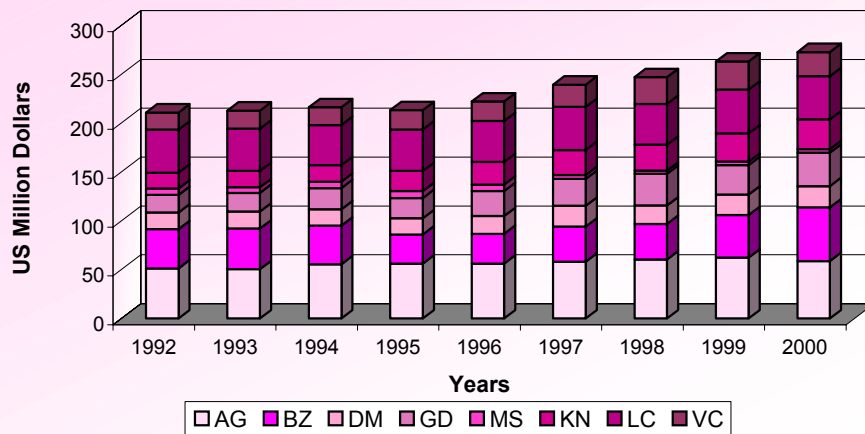

- Travel: 1992-2000**

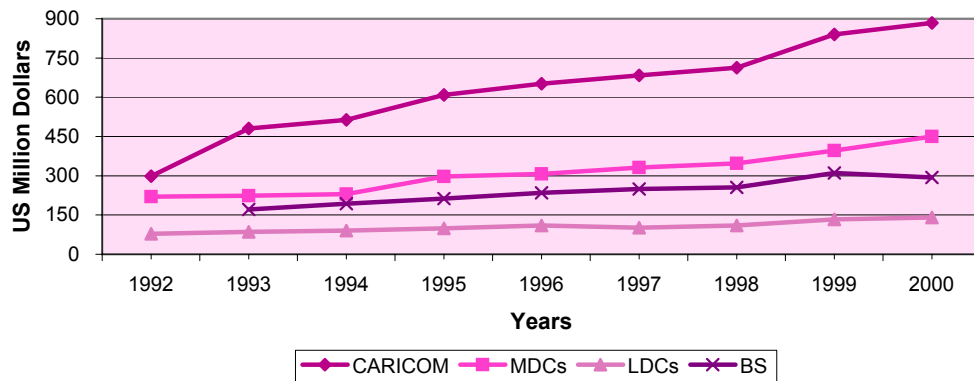


Figure 1.29: MDCs' Payment of Services - Travel: 1992-2000

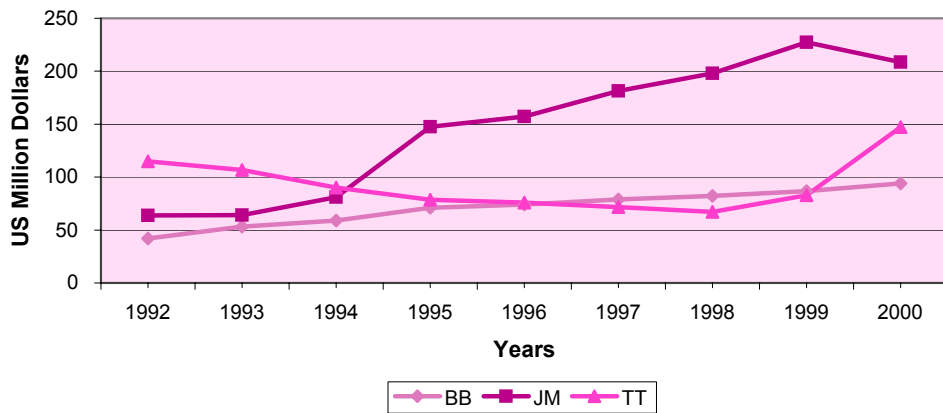


Figure 1.30: LDCs' Payment of Services - Travel: 1992-2000

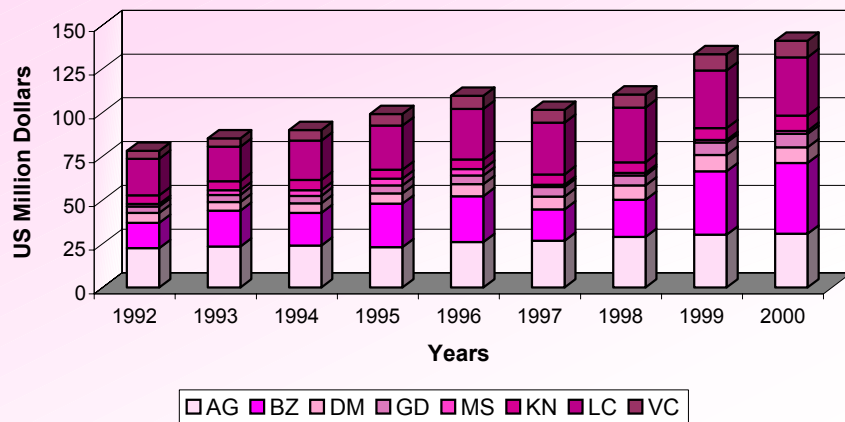

Figure 1.31: CARICOM, MDCs, LDCs & The Bahamas' Payment of Services - Commercial Services: 1992-2000

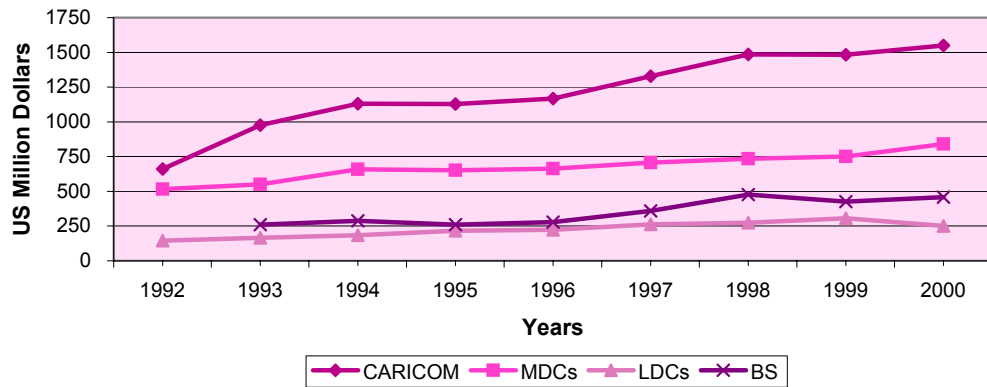


Figure 1.32: MDCs' Payment of Services - Commercial Services: 1992-2000

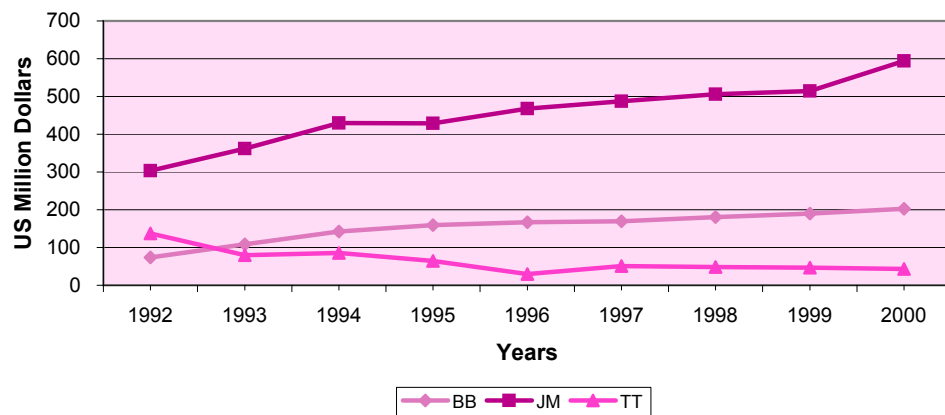


Figure 1.33: LDCs' Payment of Services - Commercial Services: 1992-2000

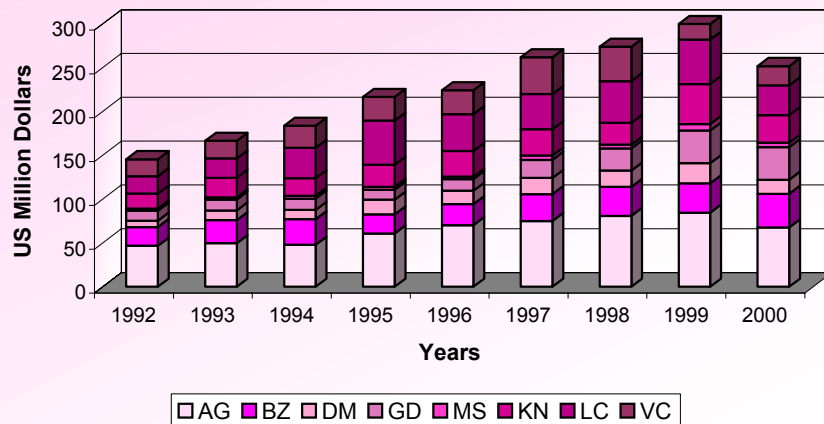

Figure 1.34: CARICOM, MDCs, LDCs & The Bahamas' Payment of Services - Government Services: 1992-2000

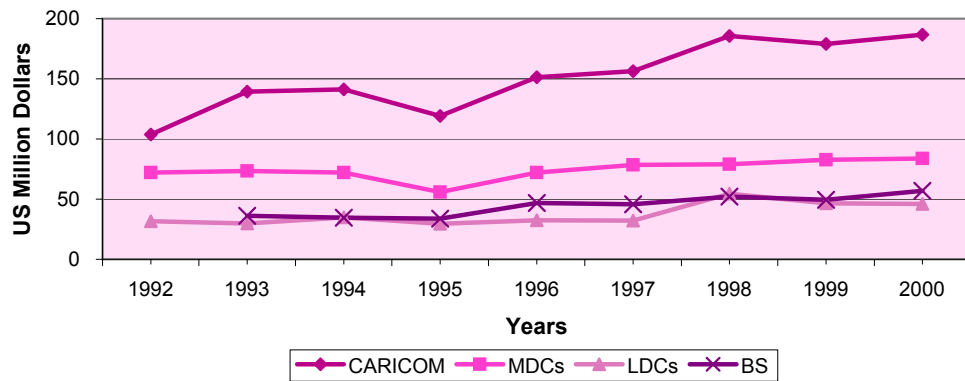


Figure 1.35: MDCs' Payment of Services - Government Services: 1992-2000

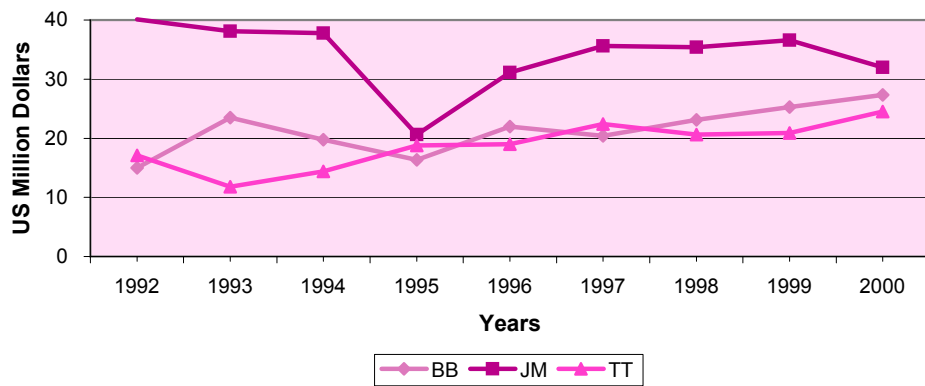


Figure 1.36: LDCs' Payment of Services - Government Services: 1992-2000

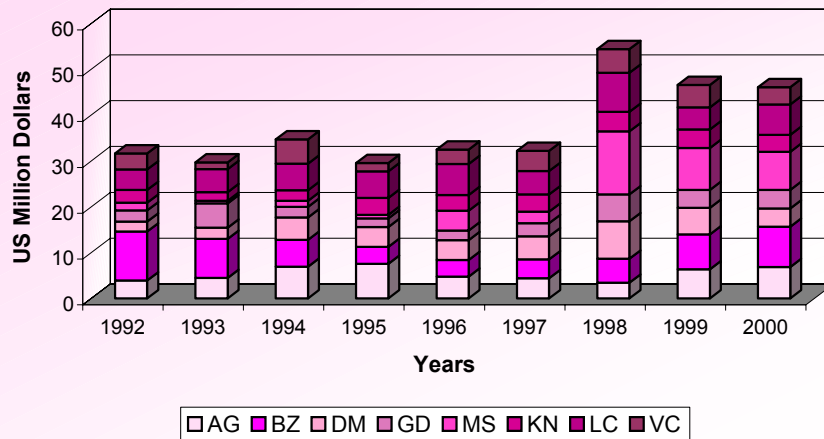

Figure 1.37: CARICOM's Balances of Goods and Services: 1992-2000

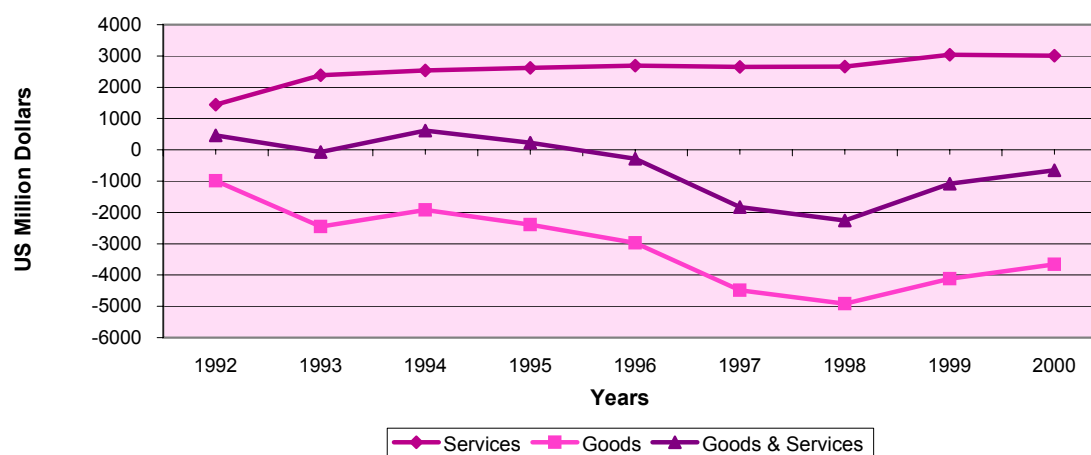


Figure 1.38: MDCs' Balances of Goods and Services: 1992-2000

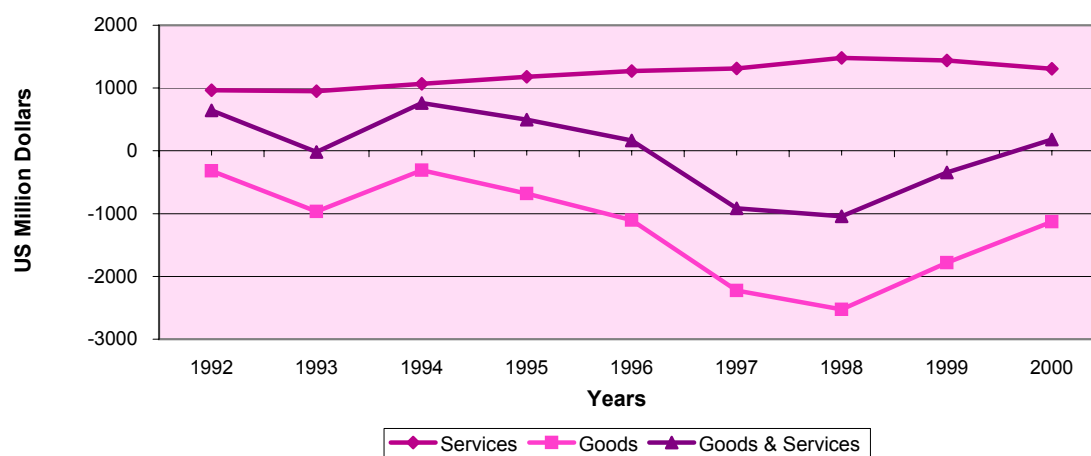


Figure 1.39: LDCs' Balances of Goods and Services: 1992-2000

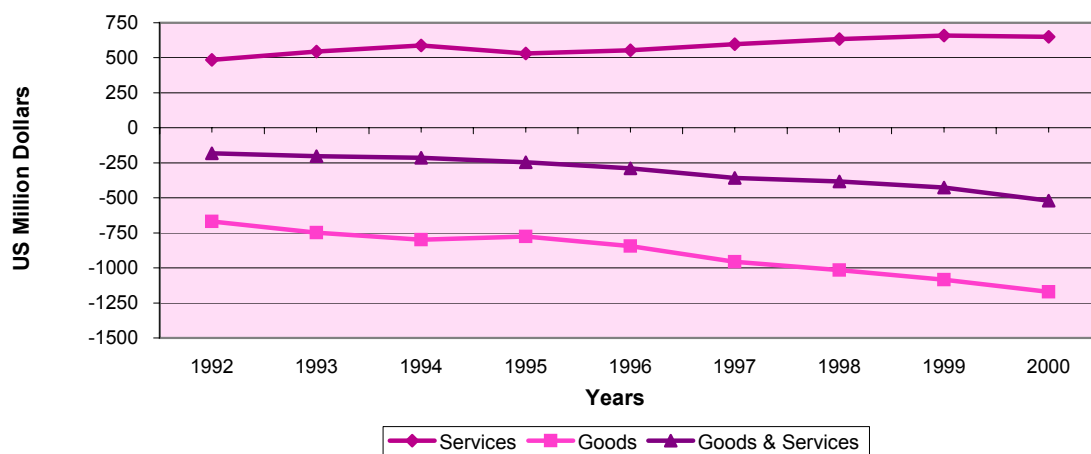

Figure 1.40: MDCs and The Bahamas' Transportation Balance: 1992-2000

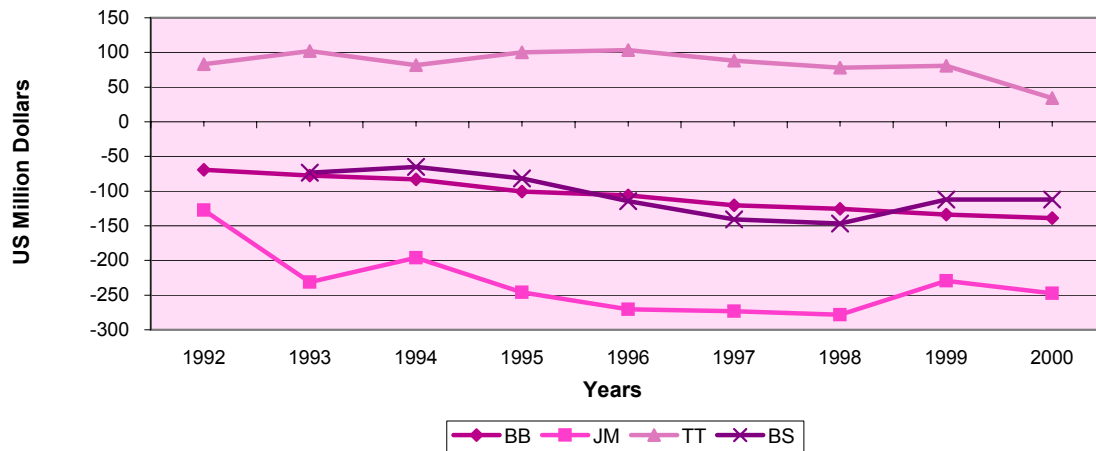


Figure 1.41a: Selected LDCs' Transportation Balance: 1992-2000

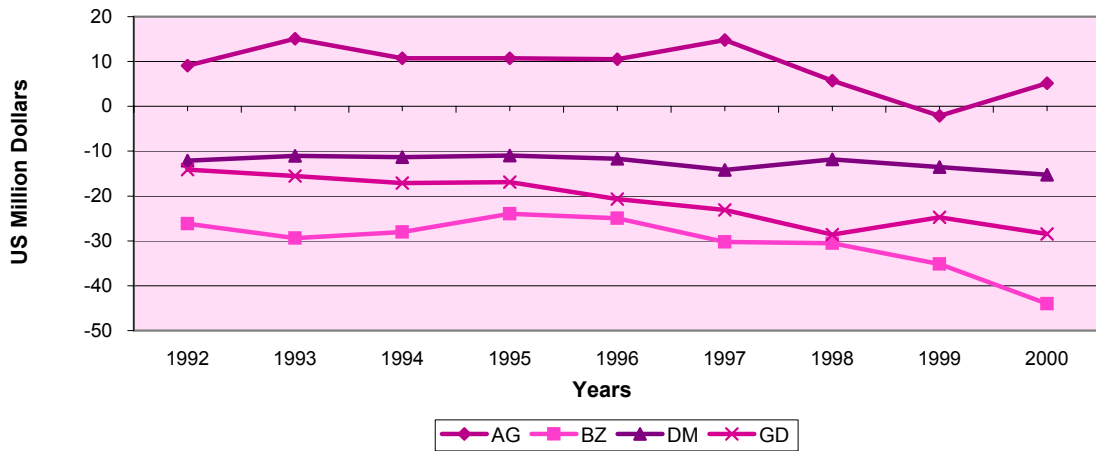


Figure 1.41b: Selected LDCs' Transportation Balance: 1992-2000

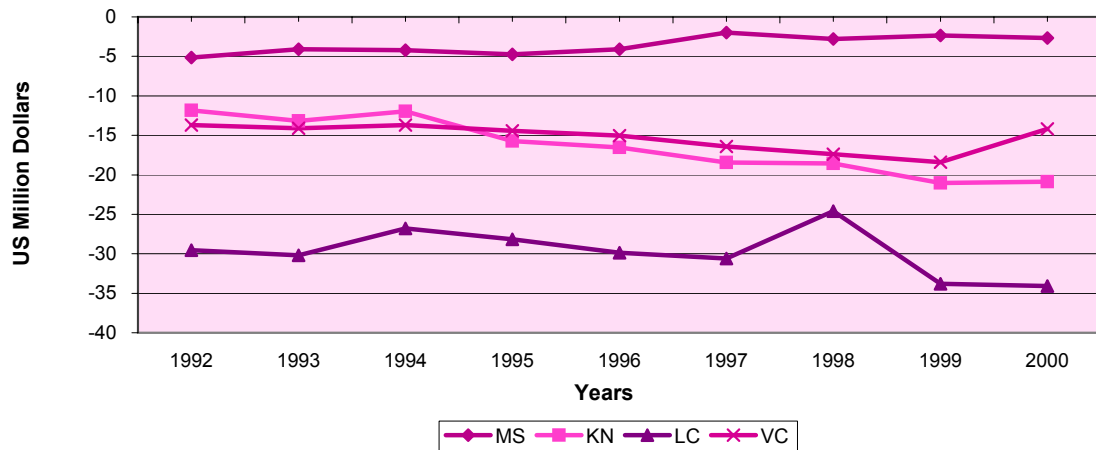

Figure 1.42: MDCs and The Bahamas' Travel Balance: 1992-2000

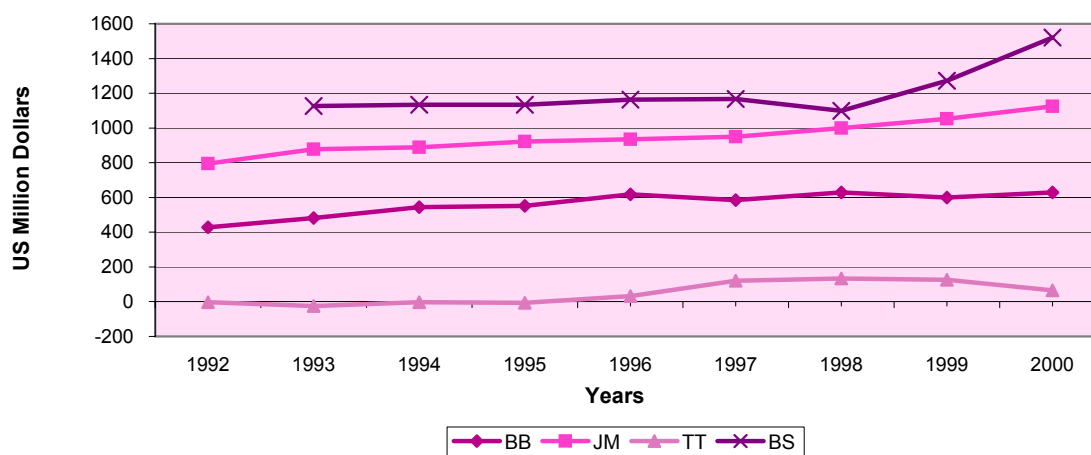


Figure 1.43a: Selected LDCs' Travel Balance: 1992-2000

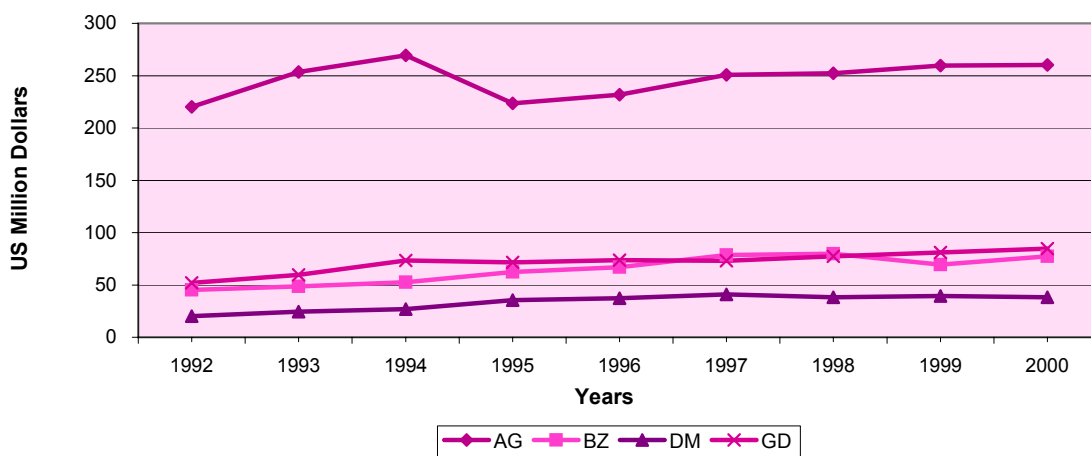


Figure 1.43b: Selected LDCs' Travel Balance: 1992-2000

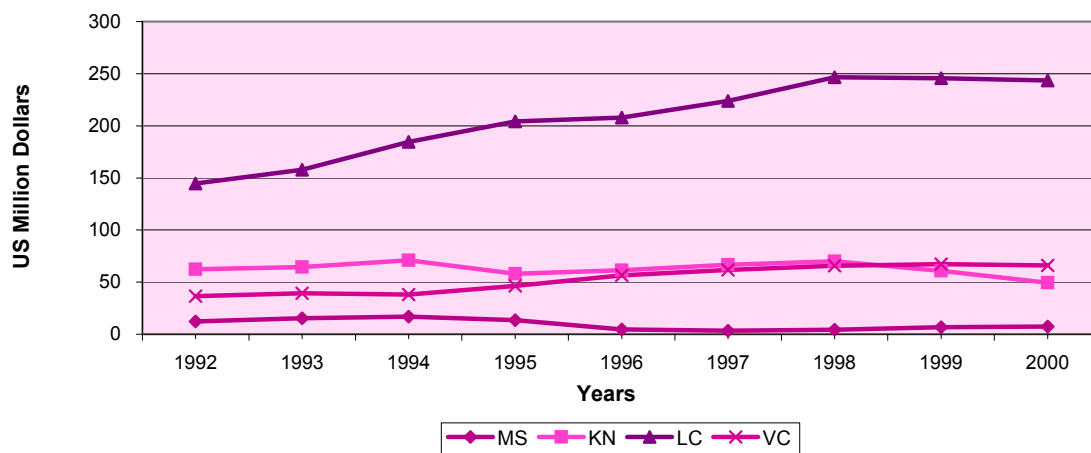

Figure 1.44: MDCs and The Bahamas' Commercial Services Balance: 1992-2000

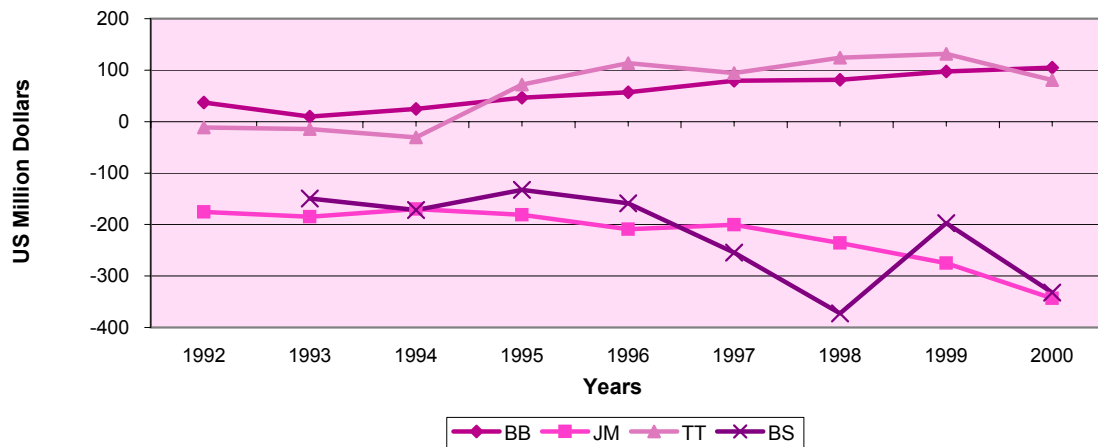


Figure 1.45a: Selected LDCs' Commercial Services Balance: 1992-2000

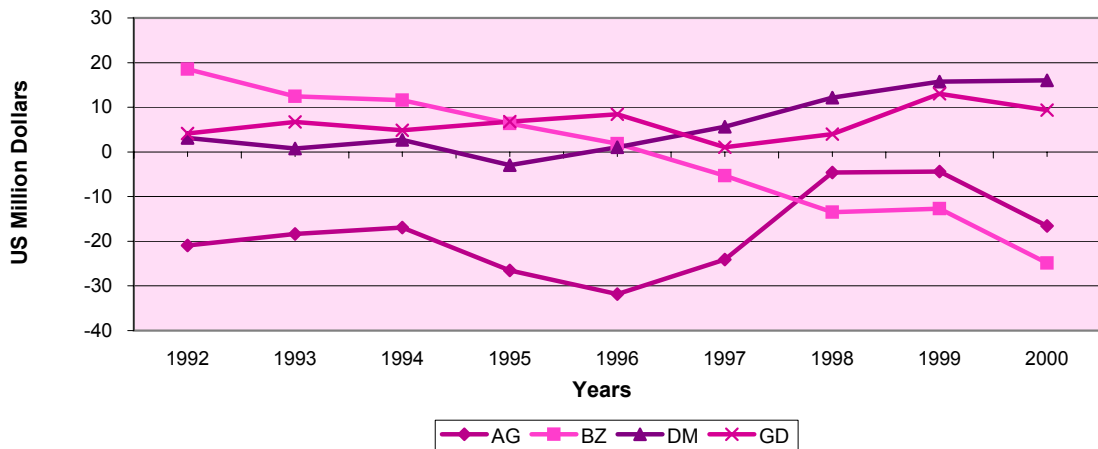


Figure 1.45b: Selected LDCs' Commercial Services Balance: 1992-2000

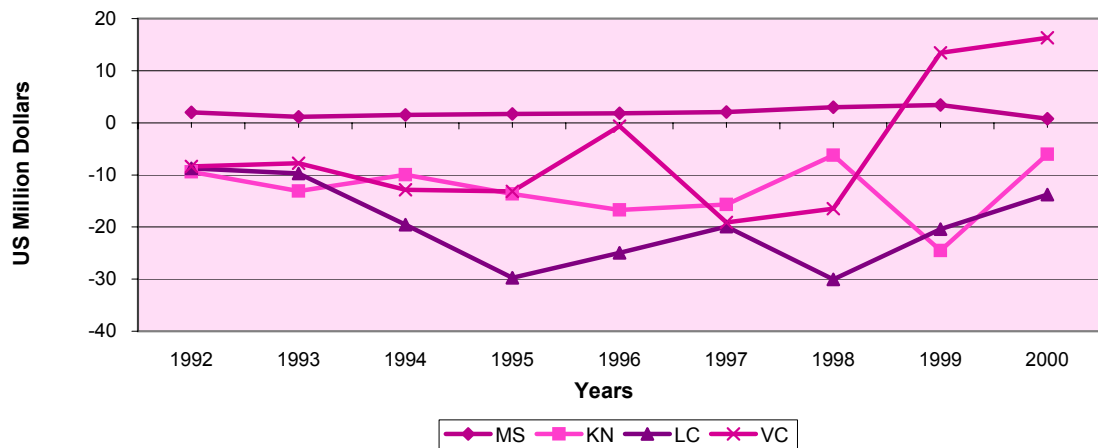

Figure 1.46: MDCs and The Bahamas' Government Services Balance: 1992-2000

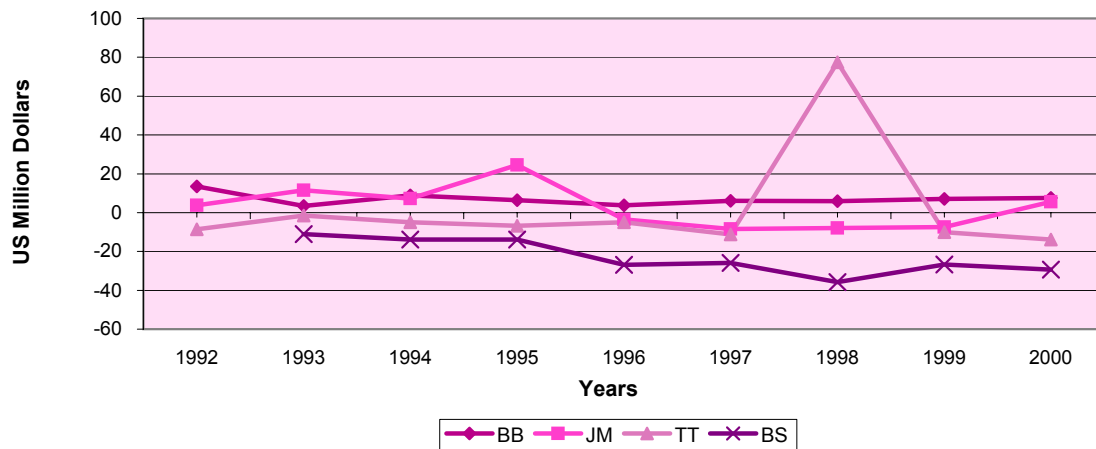


Figure 1.47a: Selected LDCs' Government Services Balance: 1992-2000

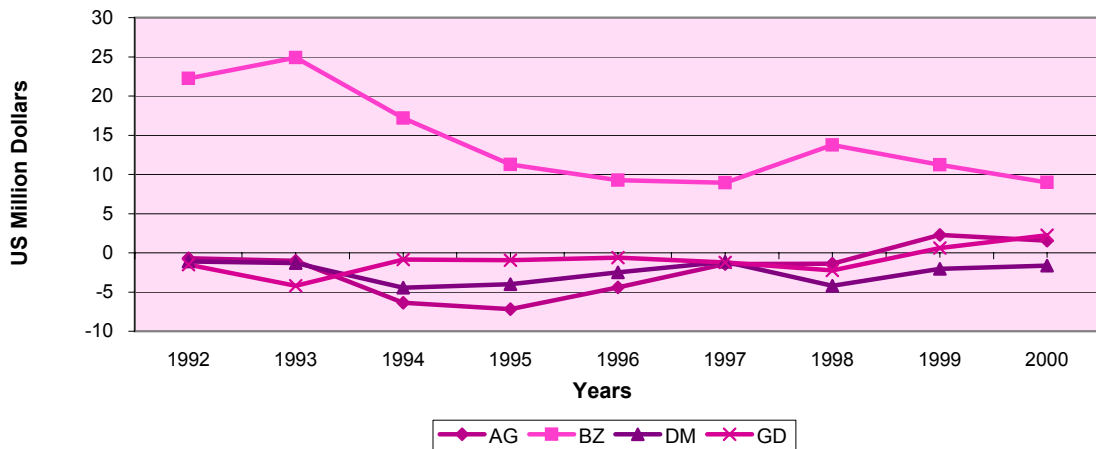
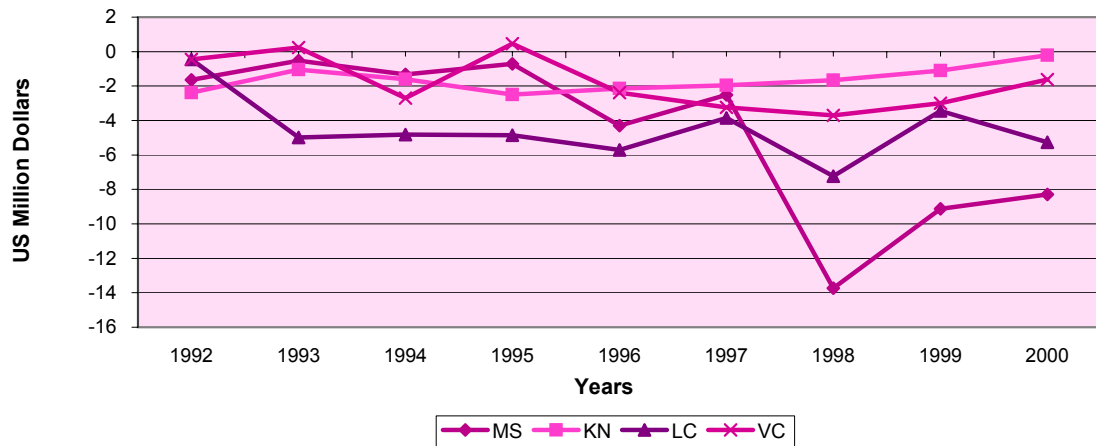


Figure 1.47b: Selected LDCs' Government Services Balance: 1992-2000

Figure 1.48: CARICOM's Trade in Services -Receipt, Payment and Balance of Services: 1992-2000

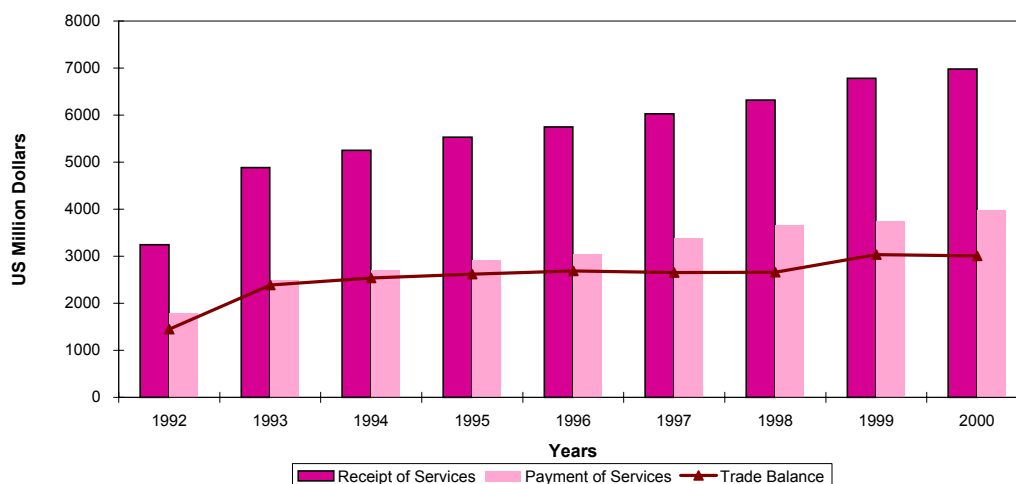


Figure 1.49: CARICOM's Receipt of Services: 1992-2000

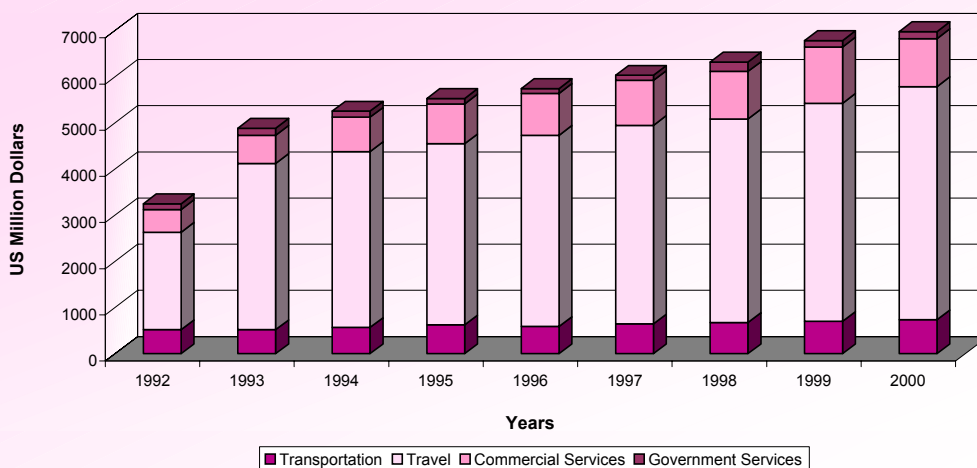
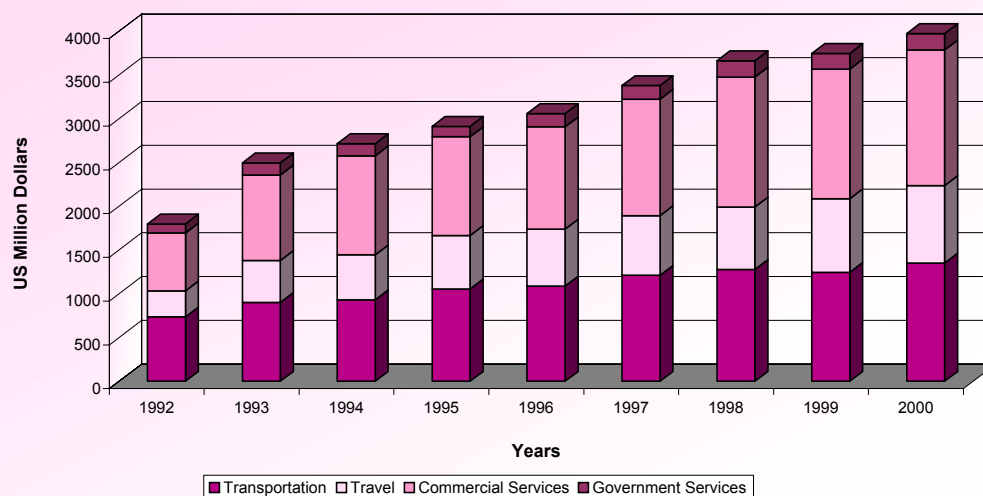


Figure 1.50: CARICOM's Payment of Services: 1992-2000

Figure 1.51: Antigua and Barbuda's Trade in Services -Receipt, Payment and Balance of Services: 1992-2000

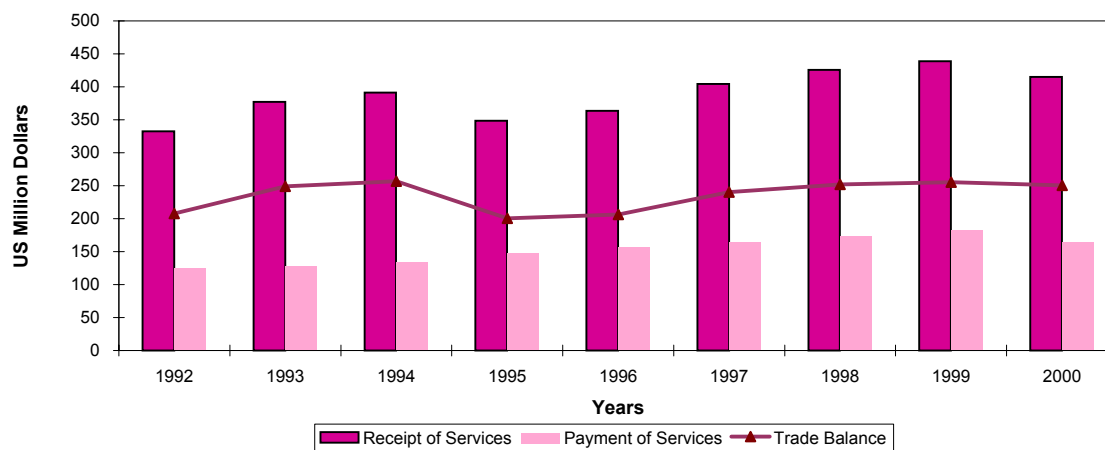


Figure 1.52: Antigua and Barbuda's Receipt of Services: 1992-2000

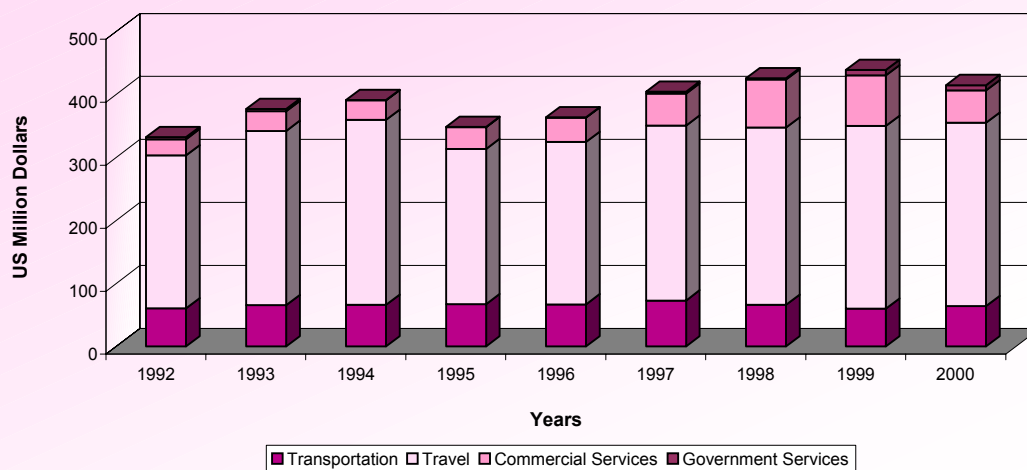
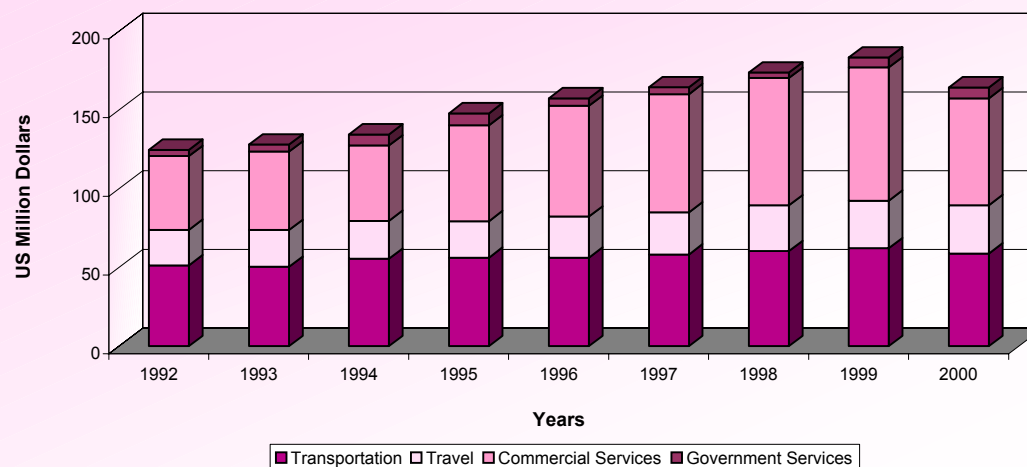


Figure 1.53: Antigua and Barbuda's Payment of Services: 1992-2000

Figure 1.54: The Bahamas' Trade in Services -Receipt, Payment and Balance of Services: 1993-2000

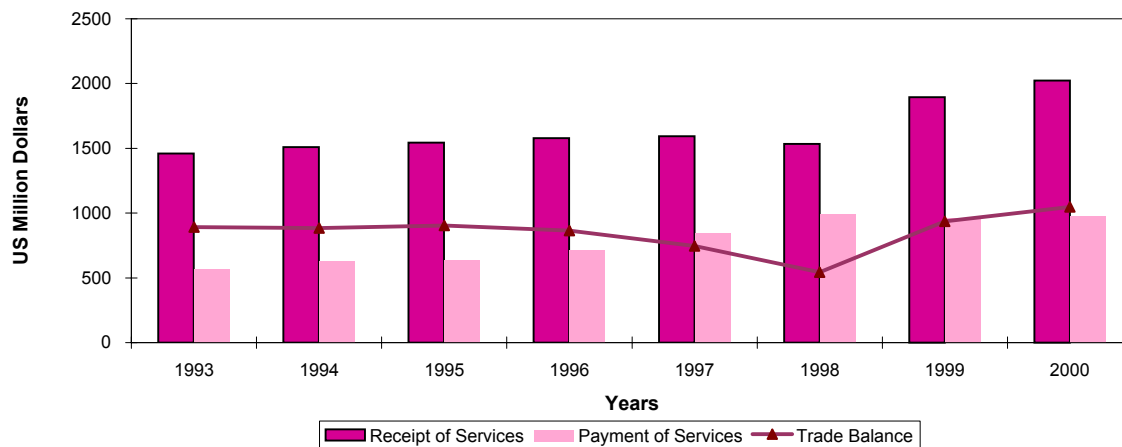


Figure 1.55: The Bahamas' Receipt of Services: 1993-2000

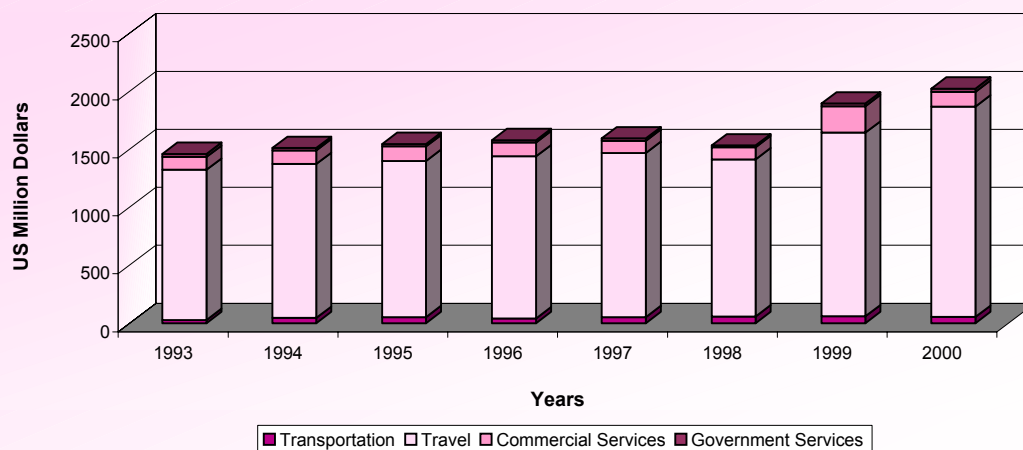
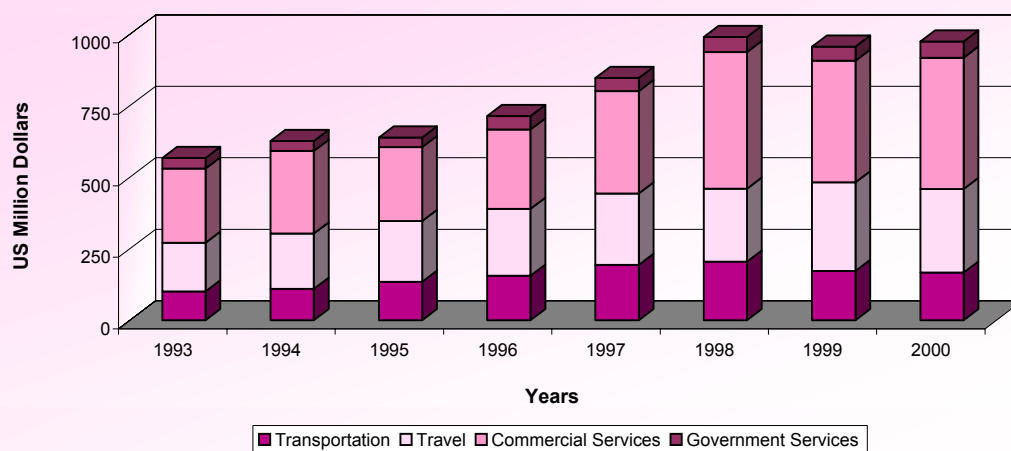


Figure 1.56: The Bahamas' Payment of Services: 1993-2000

Figure 1.57: Barbados' Trade in Services -Receipt, Payment and Balance of Services: 1990-2000

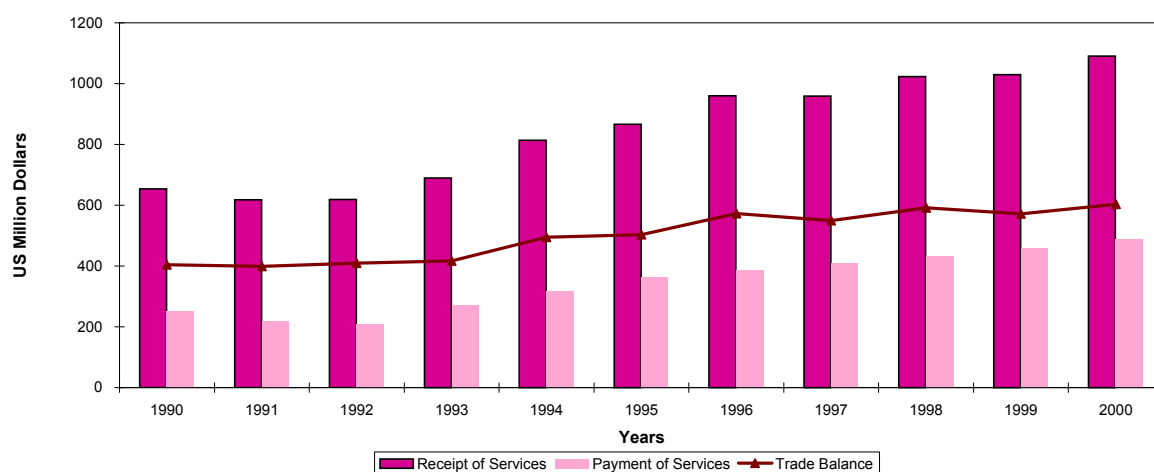


Figure 1.58: Barbados' Receipt of Services: 1990-2000

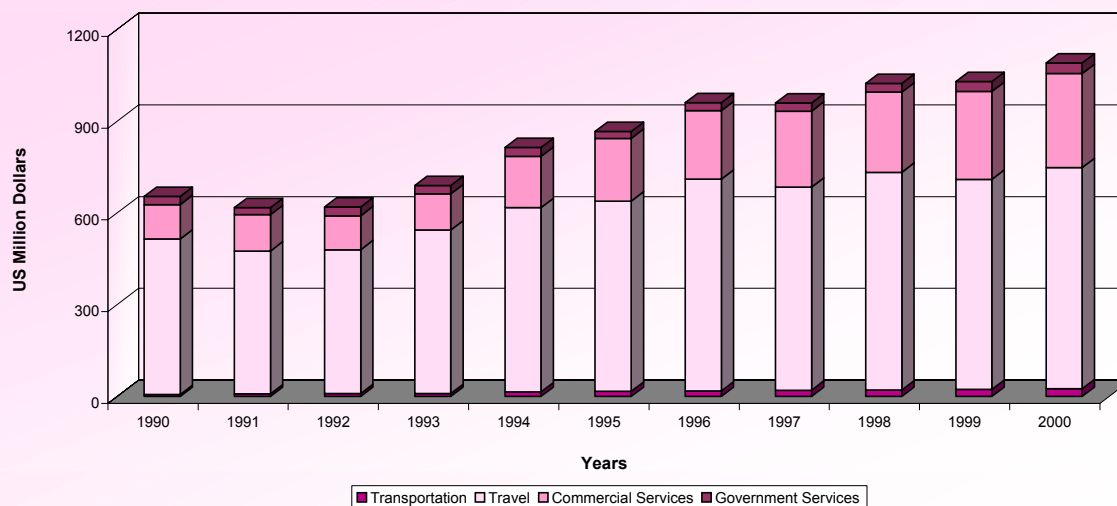
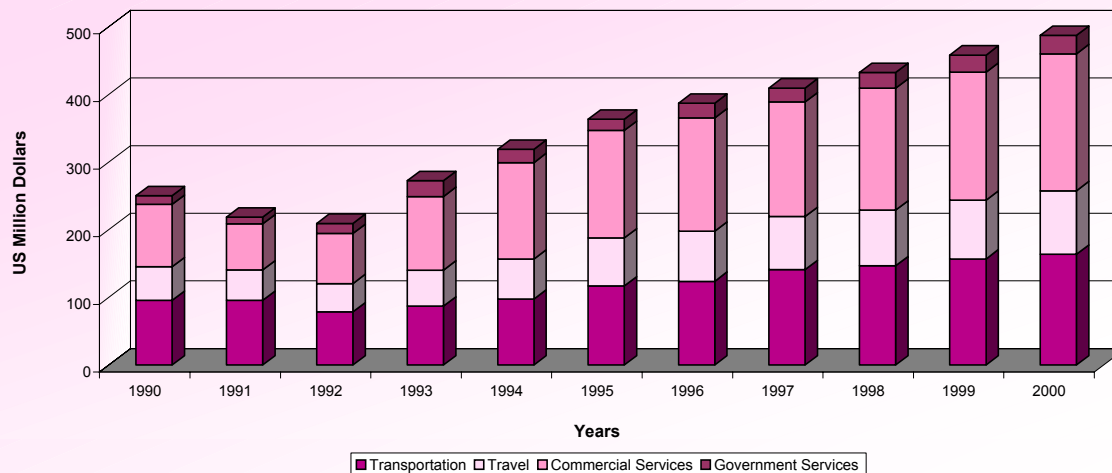


Figure 1.59: Barbados' Payment of Services: 1990-2000

Figure 1.60: Belize's Trade in Services -Receipt, Payment and Balance of Services: 1990-2000

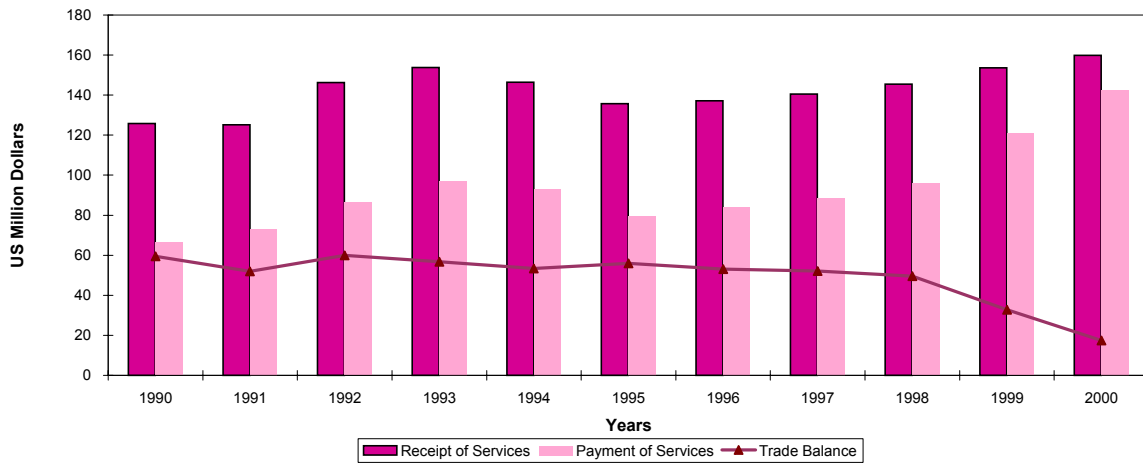


Figure 1.61: Belize's Receipt of Services: 1990-2000

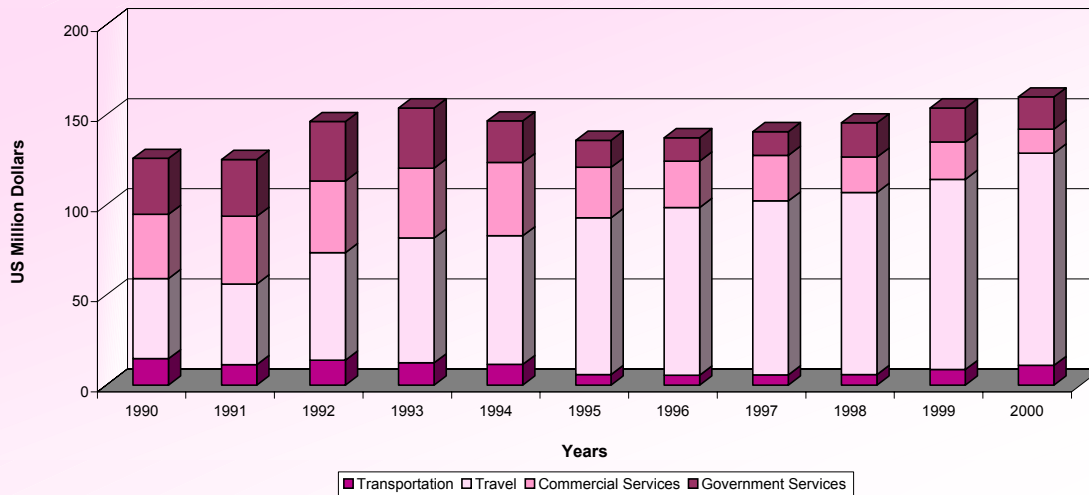
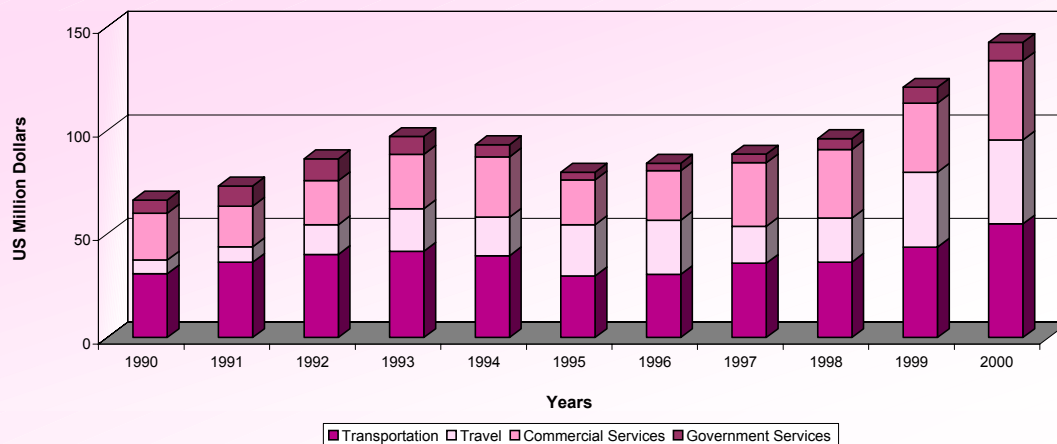


Figure 1.62: Belize's Payment of Services: 1990-2000

Figure 1.63: Dominica's Trade in Services -Receipt, Payment and Balance of Services: 1992-2000

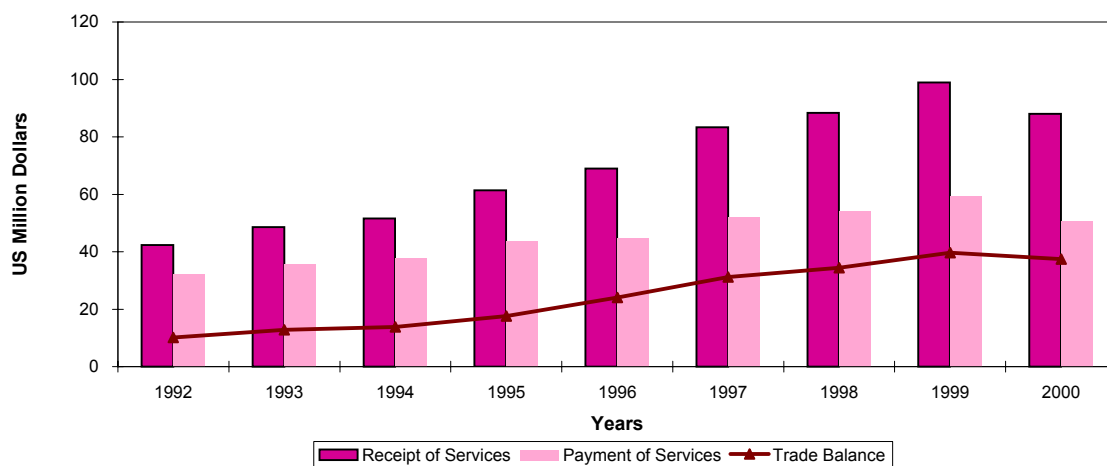


Figure 1.64: Dominica's Receipt of Services: 1992-2000

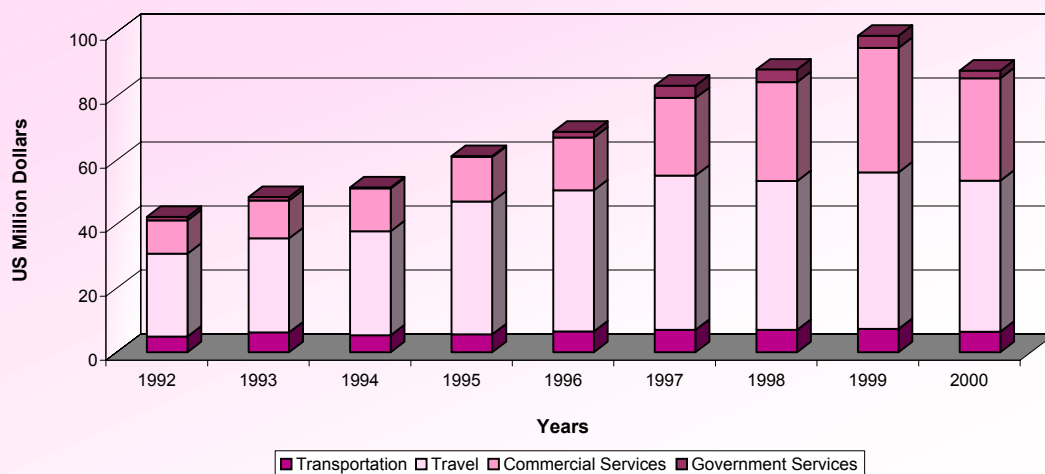
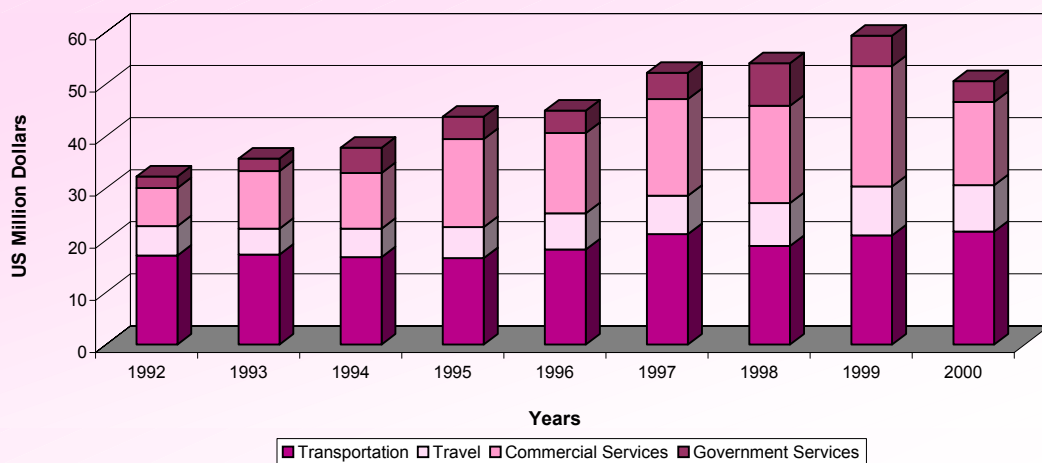


Figure 1.65: Dominica's Payment of Services: 1992-2000

Figure 1.66: Grenada's Trade in Services :-Receipt, Payment and Balance of Services: 1992-2000

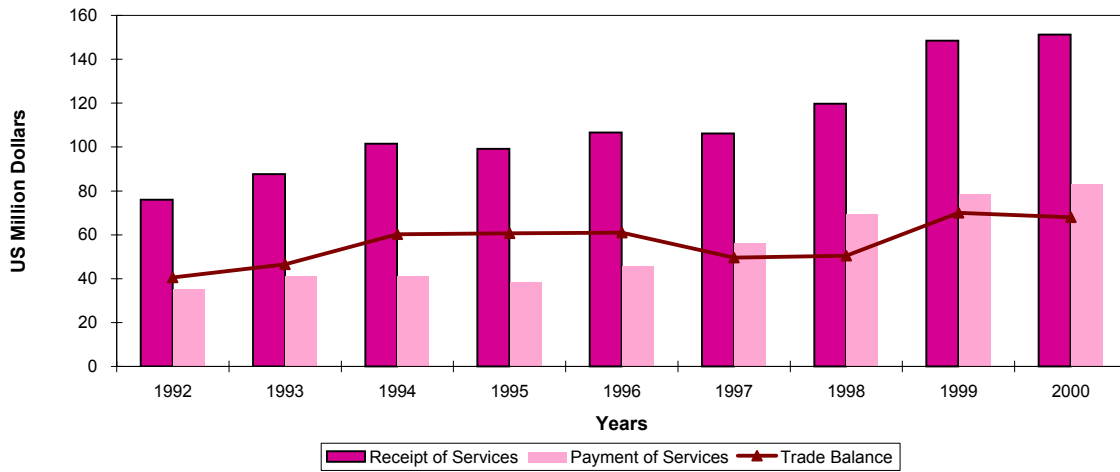


Figure 1.67: Grenada's Receipt of Services: 1992-2000

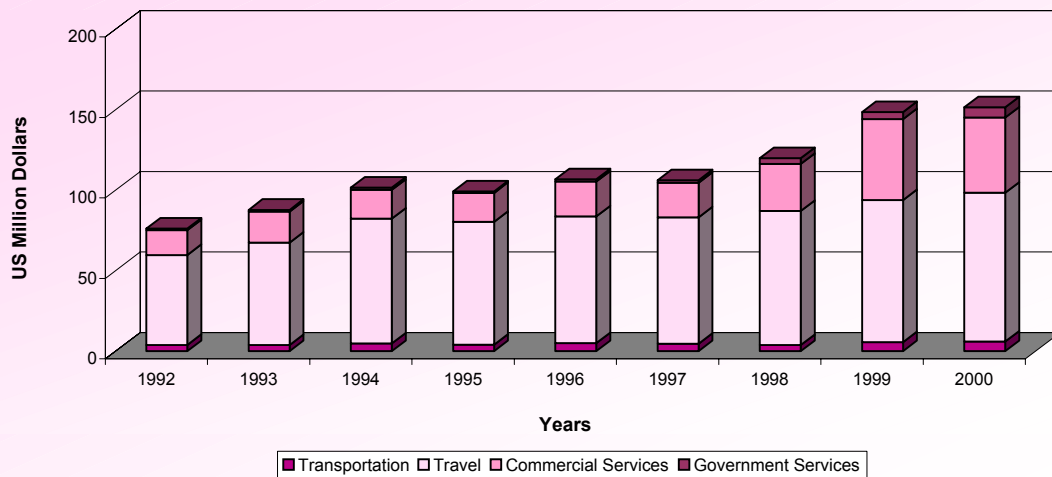
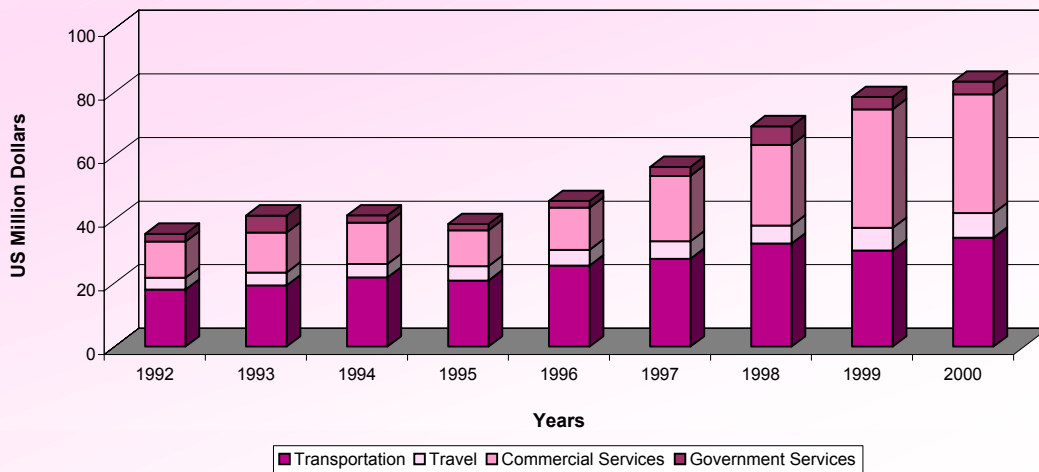


Figure 1.68: Grenada's Payment of Services: 1992-2000

Figure 1.69: Jamaica's Trade in Services :-Receipt, Payment and Balance of Services: 1990-2000

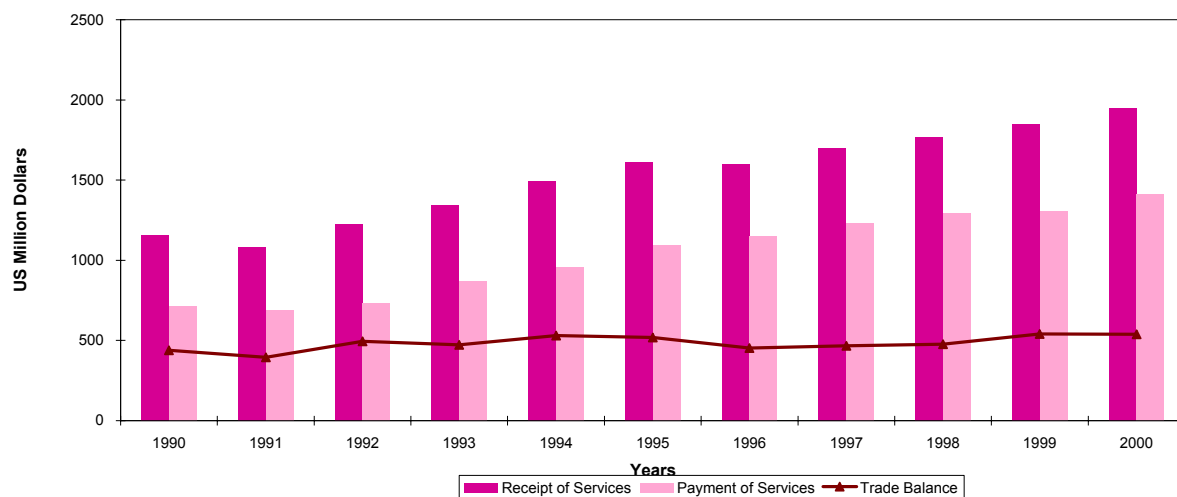


Figure 1.70: Jamaica's Receipt of Services: 1990-2000

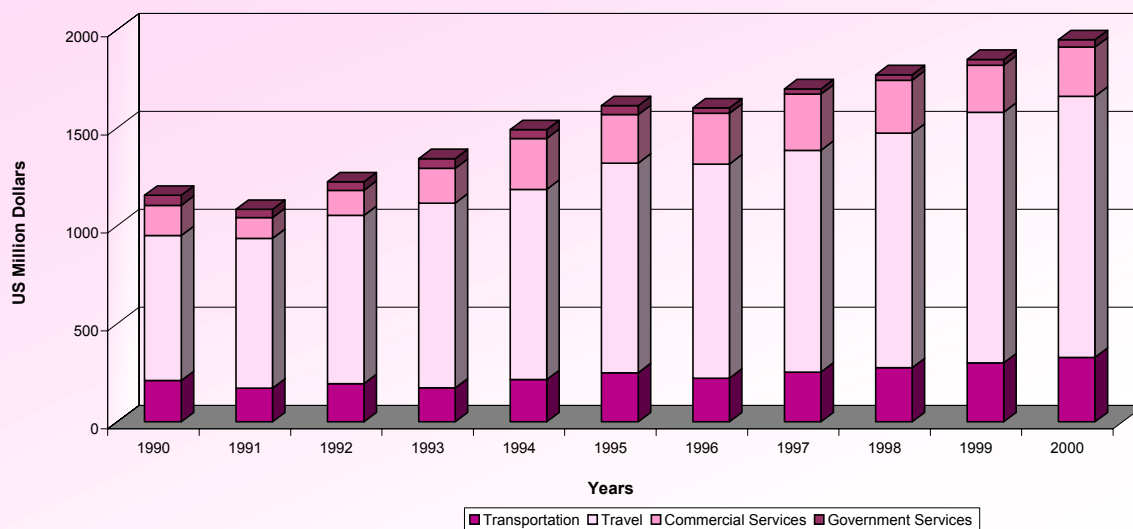
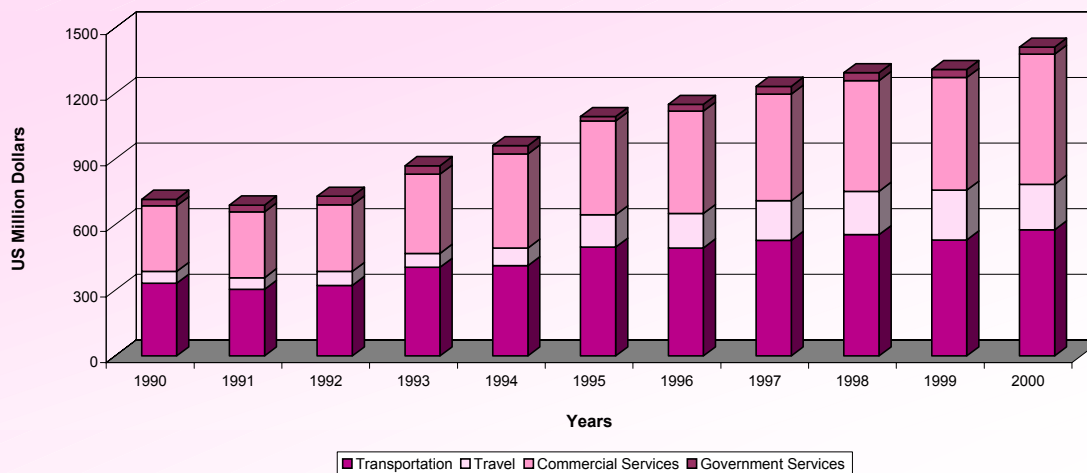


Figure 1.71: Jamaica's Payment of Services: 1990-2000

Figure 1.72: Montserrat's Trade in Services :-Receipt, Payment and Balance of Services: 1992-2000

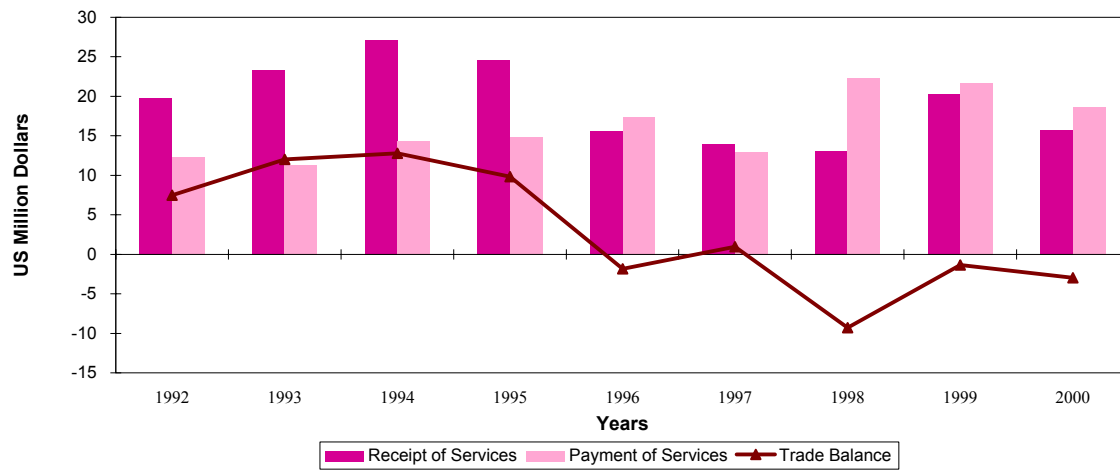


Figure 1.73: Montserrat's Receipt of Services: 1992-2000

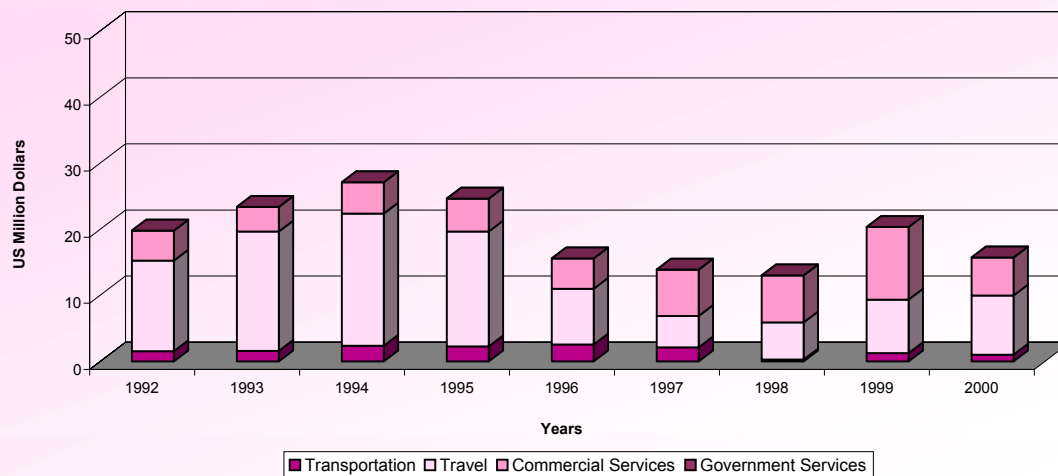
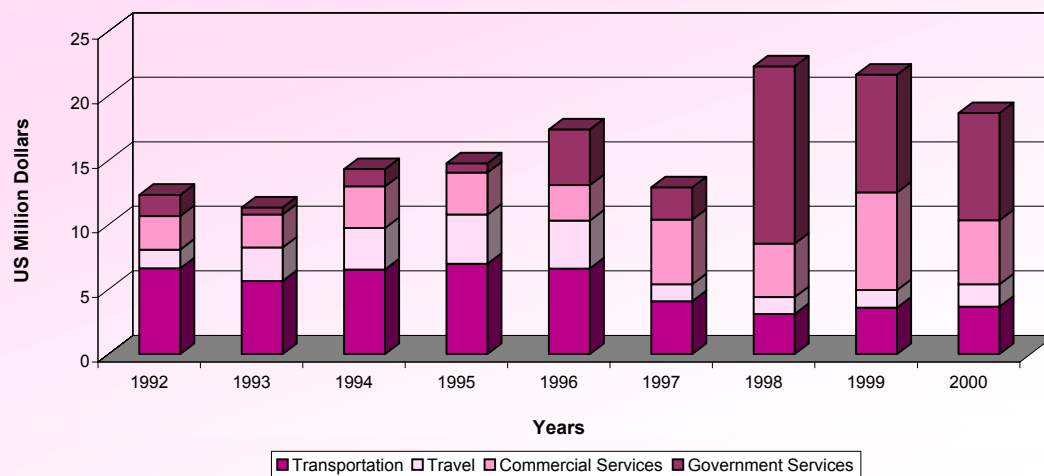


Figure 1.74: Montserrat's Payment of Services: 1992-2000

Figure 1.75: St. Kitts and Nevis' Trade in Services :-Receipt, Payment and Balance of Services: 1992-2000

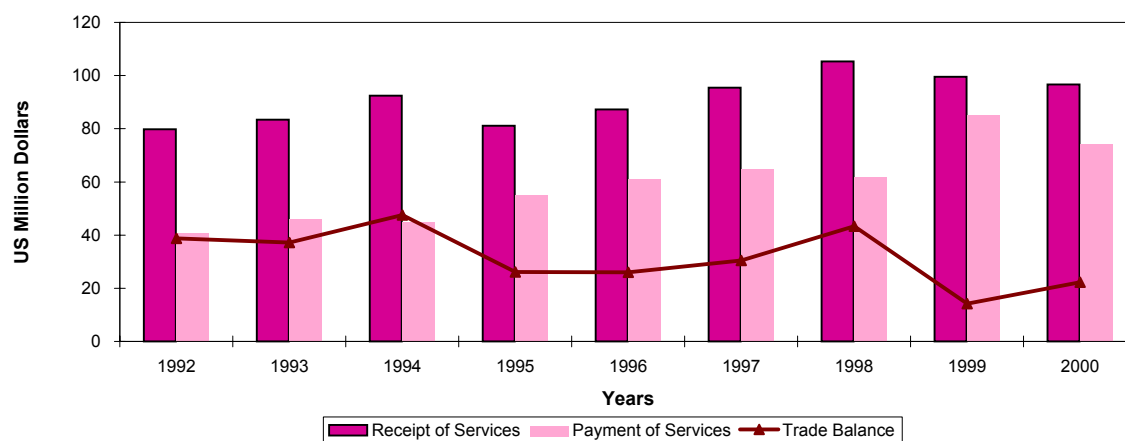


Figure 1.76: St. Kitts and Nevis' Receipt of Services: 1992-2000

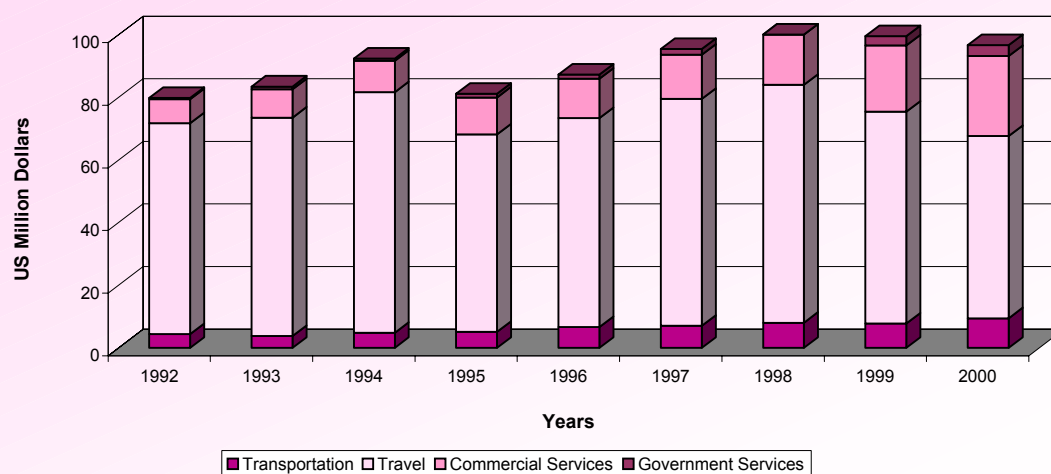
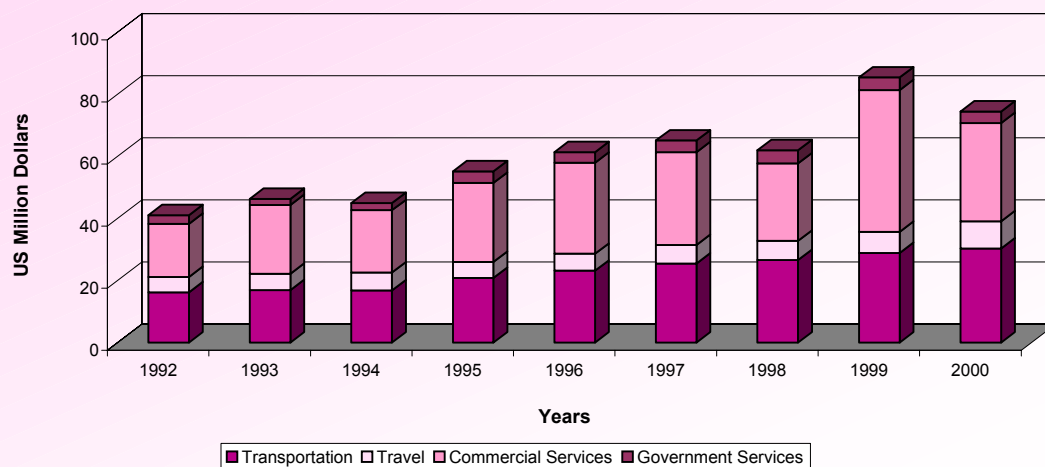


Figure 1.77: St. Kitts and Nevis' Payment of Services: 1992-2000

Figure 1.78: Saint Lucia's Trade in Services :-Receipt, Payment and Balance of Services: 1992-2000

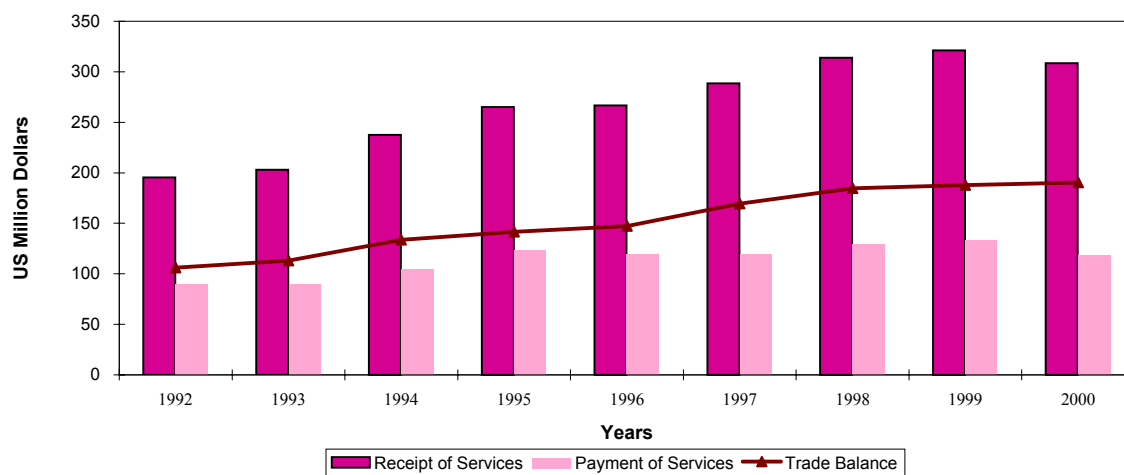


Figure 1.79: Saint Lucia's Receipt of Services: 1992-2000

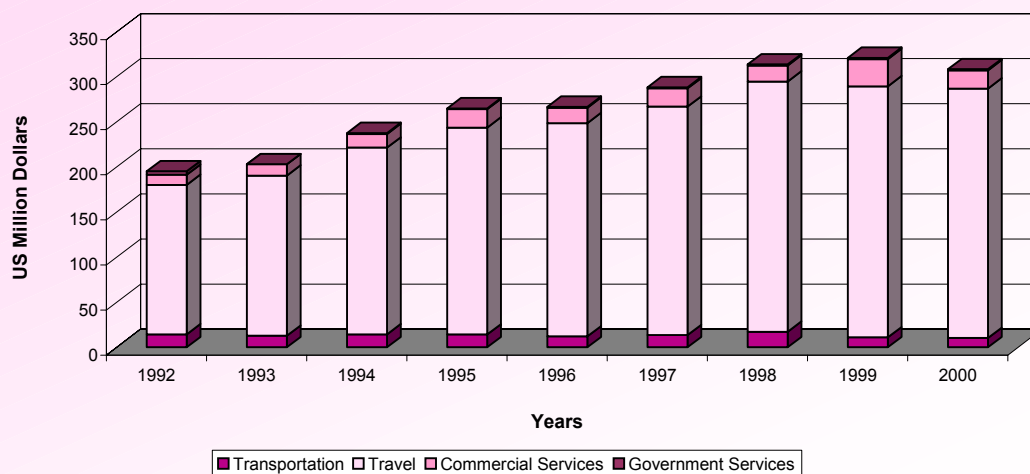
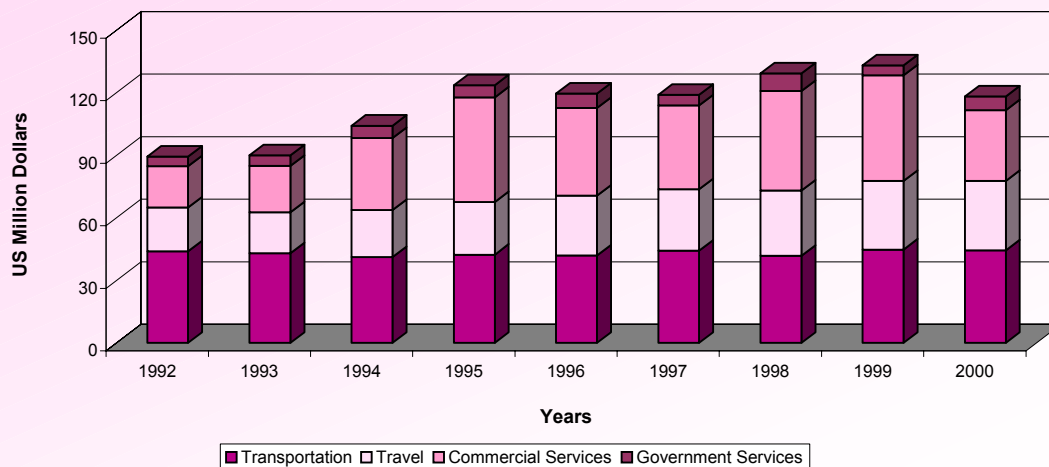


Figure 1.80: Saint Lucia's Payment of Services: 1992-2000

Figure 1.81: St. Vincent and the Grenadines' Trade in Services :-Receipt, Payment and Balance of Services: 1992-2000

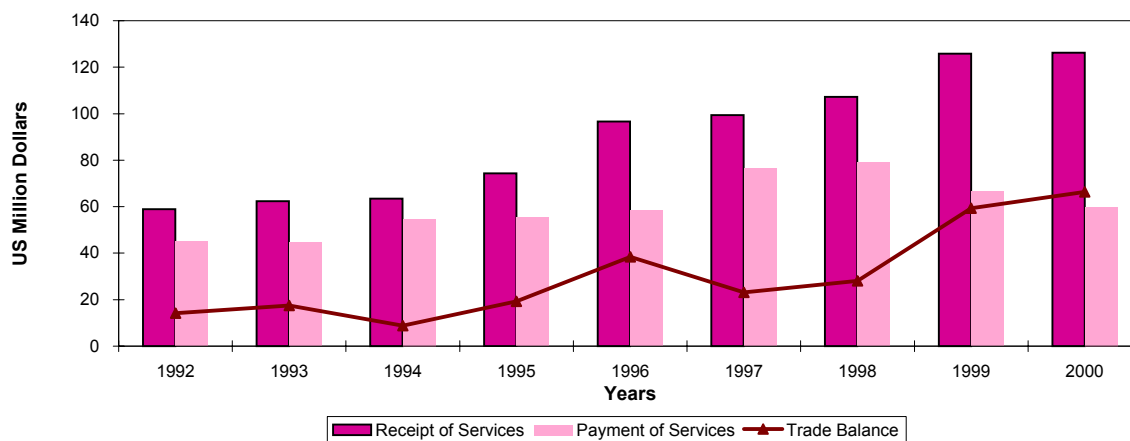


Figure 1.82: St. Vincent and the Grenadines' Receipt of Services: 1992-2000

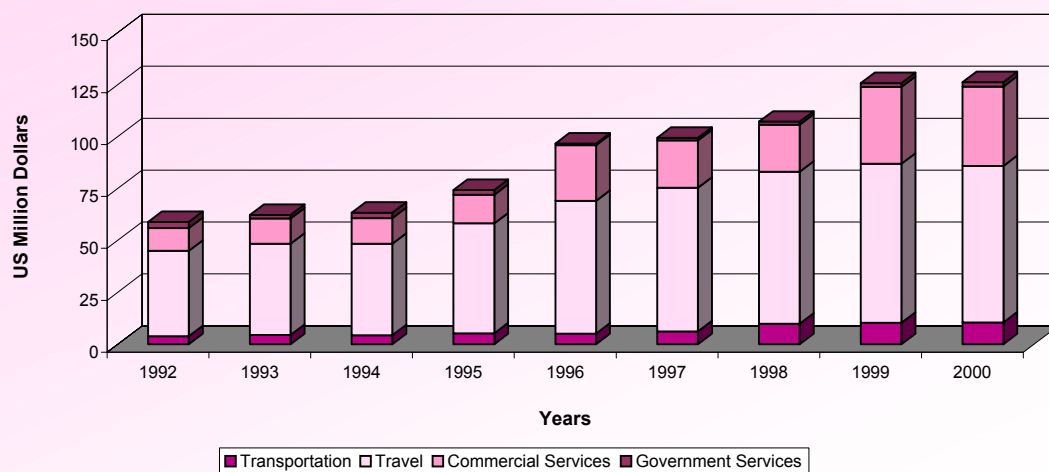
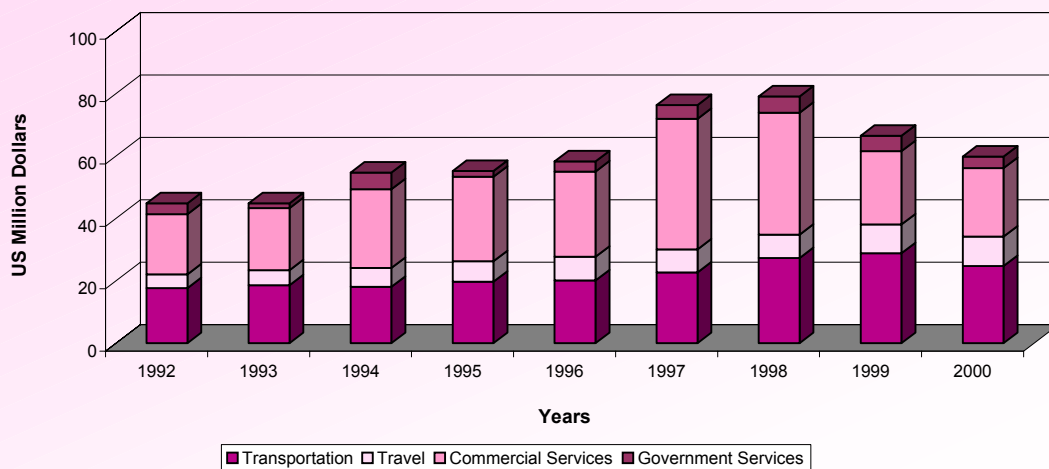


Figure 1.83: St. Vincent and the Grenadines' Payment of Services: 1992-2000

Figure 1.84: Trinidad and Tobago's Trade in Services :-Receipt, Payment and Balance of Services: 1990-2000

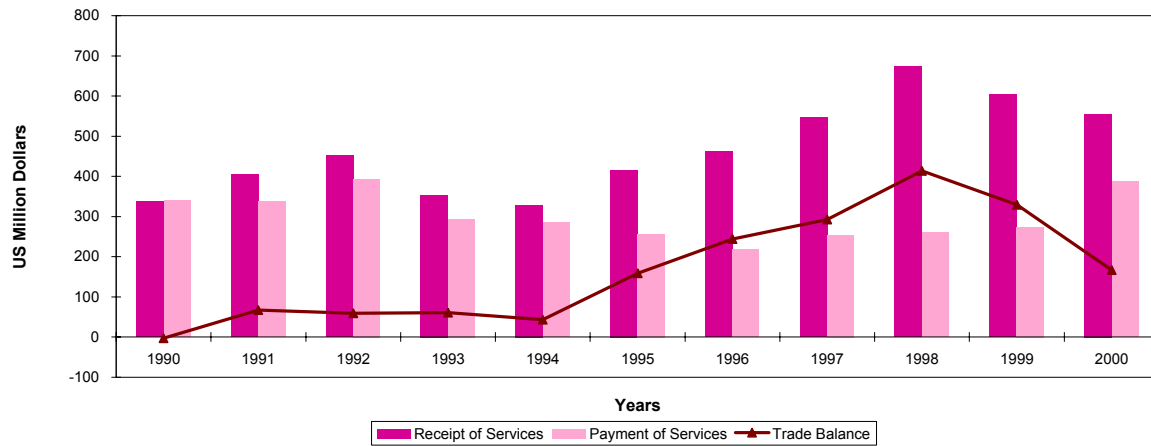


Figure 1.85: Trinidad and Tobago's Receipt of Services: 1990-2000

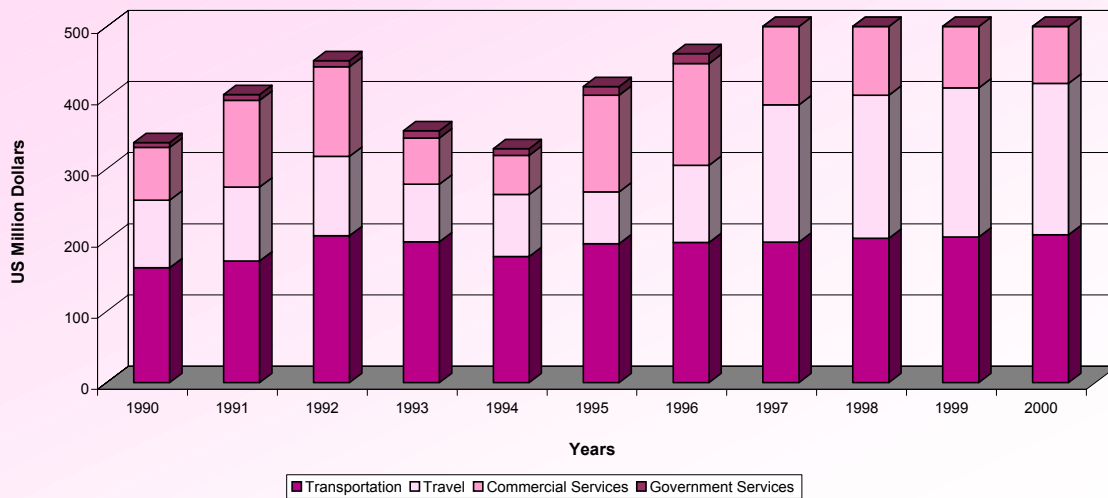
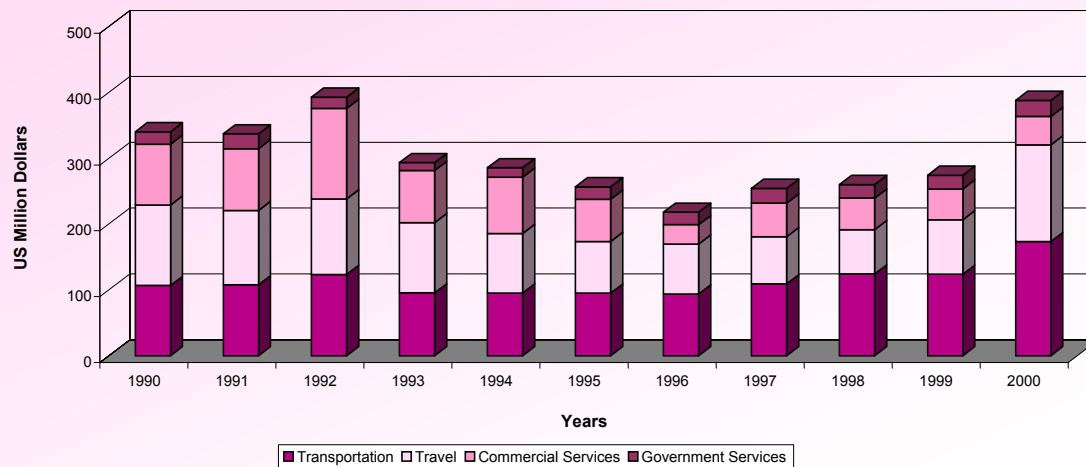


Figure 1.86: Trinidad and Tobago's Payment of Services: 1990-2000

General Agreement on Trade in Services

[Reproduced below are the Preamble and Part I of the text of the agreement which defines the scope of the agreement as concerns trade in services.]

General Agreement on Trade in Services

- *Recognizing* the growing importance of trade in services for the growth and development of the world economy;
- *Wishing* to establish a multilateral framework of principles and rules for trade in services with a view to the expansion of such trade under conditions of transparency and progressive liberalisation and as a means of promoting the economic growth of all trading partners and the development of developing countries;
- *Desiring* the early achievement of progressively higher levels of liberalisation of trade in services through successive rounds of multilateral negotiations aimed at promoting the interests of all participants on a mutually advantageous basis and at securing an overall balance of rights and obligations, while giving due respect to national policy objectives;
- *Recognizing* the right of Members to regulate, and to introduce new regulations, on the supply of services within their territories in order to meet national policy objectives and, given asymmetries existing with respect to the degree of development of services regulations in different countries, the particular need of developing countries to exercise this right;
- *Desiring* to facilitate the increasing participation of developing countries in trade in services and the expansion of their service exports including, *inter alia*, through the strengthening of their domestic services capacity and its efficiency and competitiveness;
- *Taking* particular account of the serious difficulty of the least-developed countries in view of their special economic situation and their development, trade and financial needs;

Hereby agree as follows:

Part 1: Scope and Definition

Article 1

Scope and Definition 1

1. This Agreement applies to measures by Members affecting trade in services
2. For the purposes of this Agreement, trade in services is defined as the supply of a service:
 - a. from the territory of one Member into the territory of any other Member;
 - b. in the territory of one Member to the service consumer of any other Member;
 - c. by a service supplier of one Member, through commercial presence in the territory of any other Member;
 - d. by a service supplier of one Member, through presence of natural persons of a Member in the territory of any other Member.
3. For the purposes of this Agreement:
 - a. “measures by Members” means measures taken by:
 - (i) central, regional or local governments and authorities; and
 - (ii) non-governmental bodies in the exercise of powers delegated by central, regional or local governments or authorities;

In fulfilling its obligations and commitments under the Agreement, each Member shall take such reasonable measures as may be available to it to ensure their observance by regional and local governments and authorities and non-governmental bodies within its territory;
 - b. “services” includes any service in any sector except services supplied in the exercise of governmental authority;
 - c. “a service supplied in the exercise of governmental authority” means any service which is supplied neither on a commercial basis, nor in competition with one or more service suppliers.

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The *Manual* and Tourism Satellite Accounts

1. This Annex briefly outlines the nature and purpose of the *Tourism Satellite Account: Methodological References (TSA)*, which has been jointly developed by Eurostat, OECD, the United Nations, and the World Tourism Organization and describes the relationship between the travel component of the EBOPS classification included in this Manual and the concept of tourism as included in the TSA. It also discusses breakdowns of tourism expenditure and their potential relevance to trade agreements. In the context of this *Manual*, the TSA, provides an alternative potential source of data that might be used to estimate a more detailed breakdown of travel services as defined in Chapter III herein.

Tourism Satellite Account: An overview

2. This section, which draws from the introduction to the TSA, provides a brief overview of the nature and purpose of a tourism satellite account, which is much broader than any measurement of international tourism that may be derived from the balance of payments.
3. Tourism has grown substantially over the last quarter of a century as an economic and social phenomenon. However, statistical information on the nature, progress, and consequences of tourism has often been based on arrivals and overnight stay statistics as well as other balance of payments information that do not fully capture the whole economic phenomenon of tourism. Consequently, governments, businesses, and citizens may not receive the accurate information necessary for effective public policies and efficient business operations. The TSA states that information on the role tourism plays in national economies throughout the world is deficient, and more credible data concerning the scale and significance of tourism is needed.
4. In the past, the description of tourism focused on the characteristics of visitors, the conditions in which they travelled and stayed, the purpose of visit, and so forth. Now there is an increasing awareness of the role that tourism is playing and can play, directly, indirectly, or through induced effects in the economy in terms of generation of value added, employment, personal income, and government income. This awareness has led to the development of techniques for measuring tourism's economic impact. These developments have now been pulled together in the internationally comparable framework of the TSA.
5. The 1993 SNA provides concepts, definitions, classifications, accounting rules, accounts, and tables to present a comprehensive, integrated framework for the estimation of production, consumption, capital investment, income, stocks, flows of financial and non-financial wealth, and other related economic variables.
6. Within this framework, a detailed analysis of a specific type of demand such as that related to tourism can be presented in an interface with the supply of these goods and services within an economy.
7. The TSA focuses on the concept of the *visitor* and on measuring his or her demand for goods and services. However, *visitor* consumption is not restricted to a set of predefined goods and services produced by a predefined set of industries. What makes tourism special is not so much what is acquired, but the temporary situation in which the consumer finds him- or herself: the *visitor* is outside his or her usual environment, and this is the characteristic that identifies a visitor as different from any other consumer. This characteristic of the visitor cannot be found within the central framework of National Accounts, where the transactors are classified according to (relatively) permanent characteristics, one of them being the country or place of residence.
8. To deal with such situations, the 1993 SNA¹⁰⁵ suggests the use of a Satellite Account that is annexed to the core of the *System of National Accounts* and that to a greater or lesser extent shares with this core system its basic concepts, definitions, and classifications.

9. As a consequence, the fundamental structure of the *TSA* is based on the general balance existing within an economy between demand of goods and services generated by tourism and their supply. The demand generated by tourism encompasses a great variety of goods and services, where transportation, accommodation, and food services play a major role. The idea behind the construction of the *TSA* is to analyse in detail all the aspects of demand for goods and services that might be associated with tourism within the economy, to observe the operational interface with the supply of such goods and services within the same economy of reference, and to describe how this supply interacts with other economic activities.
10. A complete tourism satellite account for a country will provide:
 - a. macroeconomic aggregates to describe the size and the economic importance of tourism, such as tourism value added and tourism GDP, consistent with similar aggregates for the total economy and for other productive activities and functional areas of interest;
 - b. detailed data on visitor consumption and how this consumption is met by domestic supply and imports, integrated within tables derived from general supply and use tables of the national accounts, at both current and constant prices;
 - c. detailed production accounts of the tourism industries including data on employment, linkages with other productive economic activities, and capital formation;
 - d. basic information required for the development of models of the economic impact of tourism (at the national and supranational levels), for the preparation, for example, of tourism market oriented analysis; and
 - e. a link between economic data and other non-monetary information on tourism, such as number of trips, duration of the stay, purpose of the trip, or modes of transport.
11. The *TSA* is to be seen from two different perspectives:
 - as a new statistical tool including concepts, definitions, aggregates, classifications, and tables compatible with international national accounting guidelines, which will allow for valid comparisons between regions, countries, or groups of countries, and also make these estimates comparable with other internationally recognised macroeconomic aggregates and compilations; and
 - as a building process to guide countries in the development of their own system of tourism statistics, the main objective being the completion of a national tourism satellite account, which could be viewed as a synthesis of such a system.

The relationship between travel in the EBOPS and tourism in the *TSA*

12. In this *Manual* (and in *BPM5*), the *travel* component covers those transactions that take place between residents and non-residents of an economy in relation to travel. A *traveller* is a person who stays for less than one year in an economy of which that person is not a resident for any purpose other than (i) being stationed on a military base or being an employee (including diplomats and other embassy and consulate personnel) of an agency of his or her government, or (ii) being an accompanying dependent of an individual mentioned under (i). This one-year guideline does not apply to students or to patients receiving health care abroad, who remain residents of their economies of origin even if the length of stay in another economy is greater than one year.
13. The *TSA* identifies *tourism* as “the activities of persons travelling to and staying in places outside their usual environment for not more than one consecutive year for leisure, business, and other purposes not related to the exercise of an activity remunerated from within the place visited,” where *usual environment* generally “corresponds to the geographical boundaries within which an individual displaces himself/herself within his/her regular routine of life, except for leisure and recreation.” Similarly, a *visitor* is “any person travelling to

a place other than of his/her usual environment for less than twelve months and whose main purpose of trip is other than the exercise of an activity remunerated from within the place visited.” Visitors are further classified in two ways:

- a. either *tourists*, who stay for at least one night in the place visited, or *same-day visitors*, who visit a place for less than one day; and
 - b. either *international visitors*, whose country of residence is different from the country visited, or *domestic visitors*, whose country of residence is the country visited.
14. For comparison with the concepts of *travel* and *traveller* as used in this *Manual*, the focus is on international visitors. The *TSA* definitions exclude military personnel on active duty and diplomats and their entourages in the same way as does this *Manual*. The areas where this *Manual* differs from the *TSA* definitions are the following:
- a. The *TSA* regards students and medical patients in the same way as other visitors. In contrast *BPM5* and this *Manual* regard them as residents of their home economies, even when they are in another country for one year or more.
 - b. The *TSA* excludes from the definition of visitors all individuals who move to another economy primarily for the purpose of earning income, whereas this *Manual* recommends that the “one year guideline” be followed—that is, if an individual moves to another economy for less than one year, then that individual is regarded as a traveller, regardless of the purpose of the travel. Thus, while this *Manual* includes the expenditure of border and seasonal workers in travel, the *TSA* excludes such individuals from their definition of visitor.

Breakdowns of tourism expenditure and the GATS

15. An information need of trade negotiators and trade policy makers concerns the identification and quantification of product breakdowns of trade in services. Insofar as implementation of the *TSA* identifies product breakdowns of tourist expenditure—particularly a breakdown between expenditure on goods and expenditure on services, with a further, more detailed breakdown of expenditure on services beyond what is available from EBOPS memorandum items—then that is relevant information.
16. Annex 1 of the *TSA* lists *tourism characteristic products* and *tourism connected products* in terms of the *CPC*. These are defined as follows:
- **Tourism characteristic products** : “those, which, in most countries, it is considered, would cease to exist in meaningful quantity or those for which the level of consumption would be significantly reduced in the absence of visitors, and for which statistical information seems possible to obtain.”
 - **Tourism connected products** : “a residual category including those that have been identified as tourism specific in a given country, but for which this attribute has not been acknowledged on a worldwide basis.”

Tourism specific products are the sum of the above two categories.
